PAPER PRESCRIPTION

The student will develop the ability to read and interpret music notation, accompany and solo on the drumset musically in a variety of styles such as, swing, latin, and contemporary, in various ensembles.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the paper the student will be able to:

- 1. Accompany other musicians in a variety of ensembles and styles such as, swing, latin, and contemporary at a range of tempi (consistently) and with dynamics using stick and or brushes.
- 2. Solo in 4,8,and 12 bar segments in the styles of the greats from the bebop and swing big band era such as Philly Joe Jones, Max Roach, Buddy Rich, Shelly Mann, Sonny Payne, Art Blakey and Roy Haynes.
- 3. Read, interpret, set up, and execute rhythmic figures from Big Band arrangements.
- 4. Perform snare drum rudiments.

- 1. Jazz drum accompaniment.
- 2. Jazz drum fills and solos.
- 3. Brushes.
- 4. Reading, interpretation, and execution of big band arrangements.
- 5. Snare drum rudiments and technique studies.

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

This course is 100% internally assessed.

90% of the assessment is based on the student's ability to perform the learning outcomes 1 and 3. 10% is assessed in percussion workshop class with two exams.

To demonstrate the learning outcomes, the student will perform a recital consisting of two contrasting pieces from the 1st yr rep. with and ensemble, a big band piece with a recording, and perform a drum solo transcribed by the student.

The recital will be performed at the conclusion of the second semester and will be assessed by a panel consisting of your individual drum tutors and the 1st yr Jazz Performance program leader. The terms for performing a final recital are: completion of proficiency levels.
