Kelburn classes with tutorials:

Keyboard tutorials commence in the second week of the trimester and are arranged by consultation with Douglas Mews in the first week of trimester 1.

PAPER PRESCRIPTION

Advanced practical sight-singing, rhythm reading, transcription, aural recognition of musical elements, and keyboard skills, and an introduction to improvisation.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the conclusion of this paper, students will have acquired skills to be able to:

- 1. Conduct and read from various orchestral and vocal scores
- 2. Sing more advanced musical lines at sight, including the use of C clefs3. Perform more advanced rhythmic exercises at sight
- 4. Aurally analyse various elements of music
- 5. Transcribe melodic and rhythmic excerpts from dictation
- 6. Demonstrate more advanced keyboard skills, including transposing instruments and C clefs
- 7. Improvise solo or in a group

PAPER CONTENT

Three modules are studied concurrently throughout the year:

<u>Conducting/sight-singing</u>: study and practice of basic conducting techniques; conducting the class in sight-singing and rhythmic exercises; rehearsing and conducting an ensemble in a performance of a short work (choral/instrumental/mixed)

<u>Aural training</u>: aural analysis and transcription of rhythms including basic syncopations and metric modulations; recognition of chords and chord progressions; locating and correcting errors; melodic dictation of two-part counterpoint and four-part harmony. Aural analysis of form.

<u>Keyboard skills:</u> continuation from the NZSM 161 eight graded keyboard modules. Following a short assessment with the keyboard tutor, students will enter the paper at a certain level and be required to pass two modules by the end of the year.

MATERIALS

Students are expected to purchase a copy of nzsm 261 anthology (conducting/sight-singing module) and to continue working through the nzsm 160/161/261/361 keyboard anthology workbook. These will be available from the student notes shop situated on the ground floor in the student union building, kelburn. The price of the anthology includes handout notes.

Materials for the Aural Skills module comprise:

- 1. The computer application *Ear Conditioner* which is available in the School of Music Keyboard Laboratories at both the Kelburn and Mt Cook campuses
- 2. Shermann and Knight (1972) *Aural Comprehension in Music* workbooks and CDs which are available under close reserve at the School of Music office at the Kelburn campus
- 3. weekly handouts

Keyboard Laboratories

The Keyboard Laboratories are available for individual practice at all times, except for when they are in use for keyboard tutorials (times for these will be posted on the door of each keyboard laboratory). Students are requested not to enter the laboratory when a workshop is in progress. The keyboard laboratories are quiet areas, used by many students for a range of purposes. All students should take care not to disrupt the concentration of others. The Student ID card acts as a swipe card to access the Keyboard laboratory at the Kelburn campus.

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

Assessment is internal.

Conducting/sight-singing:

In order to pass this paper students must receive a minimum of 40% in each module:

<u>Conducting</u>: one test (70% of the Conducting/Sight-singing module) held in the week starting 8 October. Times will be posted on the notice-board outside the NZSM Kelburn office at the start of trimester 2 (learning outcome 1).

<u>Sight-singing:</u> two individual tests held in class. Test 1 (10% of the Conducting/Sight-singing module) will be held in the week starting 28 May. Test 2 (20% of the Conducting/Sight-singing module) will be held in the week starting 8 October. The final mark in the Conducting/Sight-singing module will be the total of the three test marks (learning outcomes 2 and 3).

<u>Aural training</u>: Four tests, each with equal weighting, held in class on 5 April, 31 May, 16 August and 11 October. The final mark in the Aural training module will be the average mark obtained in these tests (learning outcomes 4 and 5).

<u>Keyboard skills:</u> two tests, each with equal weighting, will be held at the student's tutorial time, in the weeks starting 28 May and 8 October. The final mark in the Keyboard skills module will be the average mark obtained in these tests (learning outcomes 6 and 7).

Deposit and collection of written work

All work will be collected and returned in class time. All work must be clearly named. Students are requested to maintain a folder of all marked tests in case they are needed for further evaluation at the end of the paper

Conducting:

Deadlines for written work:

Tests must be taken at the stated times; a medical certificate is required for students unable to do this. Students, who for exceptional reasons can justify an extension, must apply to the Paper Coordinator before the due date.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

Attending at least 80% of your lectures and tutorials are a mandatory requirement for this paper. If for health reasons you are unable to complete all the work required for assessment purposes by October 12 you may, on presentation of a medical certificate, have the date for submission extended by the Director of the New Zealand School of Music.
