PAPER PRESCRIPTION

Students will develop the theoretical knowledge and skills necessary for developing their ability in improvisation, composition, transcription, transposition, and analysis to an advanced standard.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the paper students will:

- 1. Understand the importance and use of jazz chord structures.
- 2. Understand the rules for jazz chord progression and chord substitution.
- 3. Understand the importance and use of chromaticism in the jazz idiom.
- 4. Understand and apply the construction of extended and altered chord/scales
- 5. Identify and transcribe compound intervals, inverted 7th, 9th, 11th, 13th chords and scales covered in Jazz Theory 1 and 2.
- 6. Sight sing melodies
- 7. Identify and transcribe melodies, rhythmic phrases, patterns and common chord progressions.
- 8. Identify, transcribe and sing scales covered in Jazz Theory 1 and 2.
