1.1 Ko te Pūkenga

2 KO NGĀ WHĀINGA

- 2.1 Ko te whakapakari i te reo mā te ako, mā te wānanga, mā te wetewete, me te whakamātau te whāinga matua o Wana Tū te Wana.
- 2.2 Ka huri ki te reo tauwiwi, kia whakamārama i te mōhiotanga ka puta ake i roto i te karaihe nei (arā ko ngā Course Objectives).

By the end of this course, students will:

- be able to recognise a key set of basic structures of te reo Māori. They will be able to identify the key elements of each structure, and will know the rules governing the structures use
- be able to use knowledge of the properties of basic grammatical structures to accurately translate passages, to create new sentences, and to recognise and correct errors in their own and others' language examples
- have begun to develop a repertoire of ritual language forms, as identified in readings throughout this course. They will recognise these forms within readings, and will be able to manipulate and use the forms accurately within their own writing and contexts
- be able to recognise and use a key set of specific kīwaha explicitly taught in this course
- be familiar with the key readings covered in this course. They will be able to translate passages into English
- understand and demonstrate appropriate referencing and presentation of academic writing as required by Te Kawa a Māui language courses
- be competent users of te reo as the language of classroom interaction
- demonstrate and understand the components of accurate pronunciation in te reo Māori.

3 KO NGĀ PUKAPUKA

3.1 Ko te pukapuka matua

4 KO NGĀ MAHI

4.1 Ko ngā akoranga nui

Ka whakahaerehia te karaihe Wana Tū te Wana mō te roanga o te wāhanga. Me mātua tae-ā-tinana te tauira kia kaua e iti iho i te rua tekau mā whitu o ngā akoranga nui (arā 27/30 lectures).

Hei te Rātū, te Raapa me te Rāmere tātou e hui ai. Ko tō tātou rūma ako, kei Easterfield, Lecture Theatre 206 (EALT206).

Rātū, Rāapa, Rāmere 2.10-4pm EALT206

4.2 Ko ngā akoranga whāiti

Tekau ngā akoranga whāiti o tēnei pēpa. E rua hāora ia rāwhitu te roa. Me mātua tae-ā-tinana te tauira kia kaua e iti iho i te waru o ngā akoranga whāiti (arā 8/10 tutorials).

4.3 Ko ngā hui rūmaki

E rua pea ngā hui rūmaki. Me mātua tae-ā-tinana mai ia tauira ki ngā hui. Tekau mā rima tāra te utu o te huihuinga (\$15). Hei ngā karaihe ka whakamāramahia mō āhea ā tātou hui e tū ai.

4.4 Ko te nui o ngā mahi

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Kia 24 ngā hāora ia wiki (ngā akoranga nui, whāiti hoki, me te mahi kāinga).

5 KO NGĀ TATAURANGA

5.1 Ko ngā mahi

Me tuku mai ngā tuhituhi katoa ki te Assignment Box, ki 50 Kelburn Parade. Kaua e tukuna mai ngā tuhituhi ki te Pūkenga, ki tōna rūma, ki ngā Kaituruki rānei.

5.2 Ko ngā tatauranga

Kei roto nei ngā kōrero katoa i tēnei mahere mahi mō ngā tatauranga o Wana Tū te Wana. Ka whakamāramahia ngā tatauranga ki ngā akoranga nui, whāiti hoki. Ki te kore koe e mārama, pātai atu ki te Pūkenga.

Ko te tikanga o ngā tatauranga he whakaatu he pēhea rawa tō tipu, tō mārama e pā ana ki ngā whāinga o te karaihe nei, arā ko ngā Course Objectives (titiro ki 2.2).

6 KO NGĀ TOHUTOHU

6.1 Tuhingaroa

Kia rua ngā tuhingaroa. E toru ngā wiki i mua i te rā kua whakaritea, ka whakamāramahia ngā kaupapa me ngā whāinga o ia tuhingaroa ki roto i ngā akoranga nui. Mēnā he pātai anō tāu, pātai atu ki te Pūkenga.

Kotahi mano (1000) ngā kupu o te tuhingaroa tuatahi. Kotahi mano, e rima rau (1500) ngā kupu o te tuhingaroa tuarua. Kia mōhio koutou, koinei ngā kaupapa tuhituhi e whai ake nei:

Tuhingaroa 1: Taku whanaketanga.

Tuhingaroa 2: He parekura/He aituā.

Kia hāngai tonu ki ngā ture ā Te Kawa a Māui mō te whakatakoto tuhituhi.

6.2 Rangahau/Kauhau

E rua ngā wāhanga o tēnei mahi. Ko te tuatahi, he kauhau.

He kōrero tāhuhu o tōu iwi te kaupapa o te kauhau.

Kia ono meneti te roa. I te wiki tuaono ka whakaritea te wā mōu. Mā te rangahau tēnei mahi e oti pai ai. Me tīmata wawe koe i ngā mahi rangahau kia ngāwari ai te mahi.

Kaua e wareware te wāhanga tuarua o te mahi nei. Me hōmai he whakarāpopototanga o tō kauhau. Kia kotahi whārangi te roa, kia kaua e roa ake i te 500 kupu. Me tāpiri atu i te rārangi kupu, me te rārangi pukapuka āwhina hoki, hei tohungia ngā kaituhi nā rātou koe i āwhina.

6.3 Tēhi kupu

Ka tū te tēhi kupu i roto i te akoranga nui. Ka whakatauria ngā taura mō ngā kupu, me ngā kiwaha i whakaputa i roto i ngā pānui, i ngā akoranga nui, me ngā akoranga whāiti hoki.

6.4 Whakamātautau

Ka tū tēnei whakamātautau i roto i te akoranga nui. Iwa tekau meneti te roa. Ka āta whakamāramahia tēnei aromatawai i roto i ngā akoranga nui.

6.5 Whakamātautau whakamutunga

Hei te Hui-tānguru te rā whakamātautau mō MAOR121. E rua haora te roa. Ka āta whakamāramahia tēnei aromatawai i roto i ngā akoranga nui hei te wiki tuawaru.

6.6 Whakaari

Ka tū tēnei aromatawai ā te noho marae. Ka mahi-ā-rōpū ngā taura, whakarite ai i tētahi whakaari. Mā te Pūkenga ngā kaupapa e whakamārama atu, māna hoki ngā rōpū e whakarite.

7 TE KAUPAPA TUĀKANATEINA

- 7.1 Mēnā ka hiahia āwhina koutou ki te ako i te reo, he hoa kōrero rānei māu, kei konei te kaupapa Tuakana/Teina. Hei te tīmatanga o te karaihe, me kōrero ki te Pūkenga.

8 MO TE HUNGA HAUĀ

- 8.1 He ture tā te Whare Wānanga e pā ana ki ngā tāngata hauā. He ture mō ngā whakamātautau me ērā atu o ngā taturanga. Me kōrero ki te Pūkenga mēnā ka whaihua tēnei ki a koe.

9 KO NGĀ MAHI

- 9.1 Me ū ki ēnei ture e āhei ai koutou ki te eke ki te taumata tuarua:
- me tae ki te 27 o ngā akoranga nui
 - me tae ki te 8 o ngā akoranga whāiti
 - me mahi i ngā aromatawai katoa
 - me mahi i te whakamātautau whakamutunga
 - me eke ki te 50% mō ngā taturanga katoa.

10 KO NGĀ WHIU

- 10.1 Ki te kore e tutuki i a koe ngā whakaritenga mō ia taturanga, kāore koe e hipa i tēnei karaihe. Kāore koe e āhei ki te uru ki te taumata tuarua. Me tuku ngā tuhituhi, me mahi ngā mahi i te rā kua whakaritea. Ka tangohia 5% mō ia rā ka tae tōmuri mai. Mēnā he take e whakararu ana i a koe, kōrero ki te Pūkenga, māna anake e whakaritea he wā anō hei tuku mai i tāu mahi.

11 HE RĀTAKA

11.1 He whakamārama tēnei i ngā tūmahi, arā mō ia rāwhitu. Āta pānuitia, kua tohungia ngā rā tuku mahi me ngā taturanga. Kua tohungia hoki ngā kōrero hei pānui mā koutou, hei mahi i ngā akoranga nui. Ko te tumanako ka raupapatia pēnei, heoi he whakaaro noa, ki te neke te raupapa o ngā pānui, ka whakamāramahia i roto i ngā akoranga nui.

Academic Integrity and Plagiarism

Academic integrity is about honesty – put simply it means *no cheating*. All members of the University community are responsible for upholding academic integrity, which means staff and students are expected to behave honestly, fairly and with respect for others at all times.

Plagiarism is a form of cheating which undermines academic integrity. The University defines plagiarism as follows:

The presentation of the work of another person or other persons as if it were one's own, whether intended or not. This includes published or unpublished work, material on the Internet and the work of other students or staff.

It is still plagiarism even if you re-structure the material or present it in your own style or words.

Note: It is however, perfectly acceptable to include the work of others as long as that is acknowledged by appropriate referencing.

Plagiarism is prohibited at Victoria and is not worth the risk. Any enrolled student found guilty of plagiarism will be subject to disciplinary procedures under the Statute on Student Conduct. All cases will be recorded on a central database and severe penalties may be imposed. Consequences of being found guilty of plagiarism can include:

- an oral or written warning
- cancellation of your mark for an assessment or a fail grade for the course
- suspension from the course or the University.

13 Withdrawal Details

Have you changed your mind about the courses you want to do this trimester? If you do not withdraw from a course in time, you will receive a fail grade.

A fail grade stays permanently on your academic record. You can avoid the fail grade by withdrawing properly from courses before it is too late!

To withdraw from a course you must complete a change of course form, available from your Faculty Student Administration Office, and submit it by the following deadlines.

Summer Trimester Papers, November 2007 to February 2008

No addition of Summer Trimester courses permitted after **Monday, 19 November**.

Withdraw before **Monday, 26 November 2007** and you will get a refund of fees. The course will no longer appear on your academic record.

Withdraw by **Friday, 18 January 2008** and you will avoid getting a fail grade on your student record. The course will be graded WD, which means 'withdrawn'. This will remain permanently on your academic record but it is not a failing grade. Withdrawal (WD) grades do not appear on an official transcript.
