SAMOA BA GRADUATE ATTRIBUTES

Critical Thinking

- 1. Able to appreciate & understand the relationship between the language and culture of fa'asamoa.
- 2. Able to use skills and knowledge to grow in understanding Samoan society & its place in the modern world.
- 3. Demonstrates an awareness of the challenges to language and cultural survival in modern diaporic environment.
- 4. Able to relate knowledge of fa'asamoa to challenges and provide solutions in crosscultural arenas.

Learning Objectives and Content

Course Aims & Objectives:

Gagana Sāmoa 2A concentrates on developing oral and written skills in the Samoan language. Special emphasis on **oral performance** will be stressed in this course. The course is designed for those students who have completed SAMO 102 or who have an equivalent knowledge.

This course has three main objectives, and each is of equal importance. Students passing this course should be able to:

- * have a good understanding and command of everyday spoken Samoan.
- * have a basic understanding of formal and matai speech.
- * have the necessary level of competence to take SAMO 202.

Fa'aaliga/Notices:

You are required to attend at least 80% of lectures. A class roll will be kept for each class. Additional information of any changes will be posted on the noticeboard outside Room 101 or announced in tutorials, lectures or seminars.

Tutorials:

You are required to attend 1 hour of tutorial per week. You are required to attend 8 tutorials minimum for the trimester. Tutorials will start in the second week of classes.

Language Labs:

This is an important part of the programme in which students are expected to attend all sessions. A minimum of **8 sessions out of 10 sessions** is required, in order to satisfy course requirements. Each session is one hour. Language labs start in the second week of the trimester

- 4. Understanding of cultural and social aspects by studying written literature.

It is essential that you work steadily and consistently throughout the trimester. Vocabulary learning is very important. It must take place on a daily basis. Make it the core of your daily learning.

4. Oral review (5%)

An oral review of a selected piece of spoken text chosen from a radio broadcast. Details will be given out in first week of lectures. To be presented during selected tutorial times throughout trimester.

5. Written test (10%)

This class test will take place on Tuesday, May 5 during class time.

Mafutaga / Weekend Language Camp: - 10%

All students in Samoan 201 are required to spend one Saturday at a Language camp or Mafutaga. This provides opportunities to gain insight into the customs of the Faasamoa. Oral skills will receive a major focus during this weekend.

Workload

In line with faculty recommendations, it is expected that you should devote, on average 12 hours a week to this course. This includes attendance at lectures, tutorials and language laboratory work as well as preparation for classes, assignment preparation and the examinations.

Mandatory Course Requirements:

The following must be fulfilled in order for students to satisfy course requirements and be eligible to sit the final written examination.

- 1 Pass the Oral Examination.
- 2 Complete the Assignment.
- 3 Attend at least 8 Oral Tutorial sessions.
- 4 Attend at least 8 Language Laboratory sessions.
- 5 Attend the Mafutaga/Weekend Language Camp.

Penalties

Assignments handed in after the due date must be accompanied by a medical certificate or other evidence of exceptional circumstances, to be considered for grading. Information on penalty arrangements will be included with detailed instructions for the exercise.

Written assignments should be handed into Va'aomanū Pasifika office at 6KP, or dropped into the assignment box outside the office door by the due date/time.
