COURSE DELIVERY

This course will consist of 2 two hour workshops per week. The workshop will normally involve discussions on key production areas which will feed into the students understanding of the film production process. There will be some guest speakers and some training sessions with technical staff.

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COURSE CONTENT

The aim of FILM 222 is to introduce students to creative and technical aspects of film production. Areas covered will include cinemotography, directing, sound design and editing. Students will undertake a number of short exercises in areas such as camera, directing, editing and sound design and, as well as undertaking a variety of training using the media of digital video, audio recording and mixing, and digital editing. Those passing the course will have demonstrated creative ability at an introductory level in the field of audiovisual production and a basic mastery of relevant technical skills. They should also have enhanced their analytical skills and gained an understanding of filmmaking as a craft and industrial process.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- To develop students' creativity.
- To introduce student to the key creative areas that make up a film production.
- To give students an overview of the filmmaking process.
- To give students the space to develop their technical skills.
- To give students the space to develop their creative abilities in writing, directing, post-production and producing.
- To enhance students' oral communication skills.

EXPECTED WORKLOAD

This is a 22-point paper with a mostly practical workload. The university anticipates that you should be able to devote about 15 hours per week to it. Therefore you should probably expect to spend, on average, about 8 hours per week (apart from class time) in reading and viewing, becoming familiar with equipment, and on course assignments.

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GROUP WORK

Students will undertake a range of informal group work activities during the course. There is an assignment in which students will team up in pairs in order to produce an Autobiographical film, however marks will be given to indivudal work.

READINGS

There is no required reading for FILM 222. However it is expected that you engage with, and research, the areas of production intellectually as well as technically. You need to read the books available on production and the filmmaking process in the library.

MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT

Students will be required to purchase audio and video materials for their own use. Advice on purchases will be given in class, and some items will be available from the School. Digital video cameras, digital recorders and audio equipment will be issued on loan. Sound recording/mixing and editing facilities will be made available on a reservation basis. School equipment must be treated with the utmost care, and any malfunction or damage reported immediately to the AV Technician on 04 463 6823. Due to differences between DV tape and DVD disc formats only approved Mini Digital Video tapes and DVD-Rs may be used with School audio and video equipment. Bookings must be strictly adhered to and equipment returned on time, or other students will be inconvenienced and possibly disadvantaged.

You are required to read the *FAT Book* that is on Blackboard and posted on the noticeboard in 85FT. This will help you to understand our rules and regulations about the use of AV resources. It will also let you know what services and facilities are available within the Film programme.

ASSESSMENT

All assessment will be internal. There will be 3 assignments:

Assignment 1: Autobiographical film

Description:

This assignment will involve making a short video self-portrait, 3-5 minutes in length. Students will work in pairs. Each person will write, direct, and/or perform in front of the camera, and they will take the role of camera person in their partner's video. Students will present their film in class in week 6, and articulate the creative processes involved in making it.

Assessment Criteria:

- 1. Fulfilling the task in a direct, relevant and complete manner.
- 2. Demonstration of engagement with ideas and materials discussed and analysed in FILM 222.
- 3. Evidence, quality and originality of creativity and artistry, including the treatment of autobiographical details and materials in a cinematic way.
- 4. Evidence and quality of technical ability, including shot composition, and editing-in-camera.
- 5. The ability to work in a team.
- 6. The ability to explain one's creative vision and processes.

Relationship to Learning Objectives:

This assignment will enable students to explore their creativity through the presentation of an aspect of their own lives in cinematic form. It will facilitate their knowledge of film directing, visual storytelling, cinematography and in-camera editing. It will improve their technical skills. It will enhance their ability to communicate with one other person in a working environment as well as with a group of people through their class presentation.

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Assignment 2: Sound & Editing Exercise

Description:

This assignment is designed to show how post-production work can alter and enhance material shot in the production stage of a film. The assignment has two complementary components. The first involves using Final Cut Pro digital editing software to edit rushes provided by the course coordinator. This provides students with the opportunity to "cut" a scene in a way that facilitates dramatic action. The second involves using Final Cut Pro to create a soundtrack to accompany a found footage sequence in a manner that "comments" on the story or enhances its mood. The results will be presented and discussed in class.

Assessment Criteria:

- 1. Fulfilling the task in a direct, relevant and complete manner.
- 2. Demonstration of engagement with ideas and materials discussed in FILM 222.
- Evidence, quality and originality of creativity and artistry, including the capacity to edit visual material
 for dramatic purposes and the ability to develop a soundtrack for aesthetic and/or emotional
 purposes.
- 4. Evidence and quality of technical ability, especially with Final Cut Pro.
- 5. The ability to explain one's creative vision and processes.

Relationship to Learning Objectives:

This assignment will help students explore their creativity by reshaping existing material in their own way. It will improve their knowledge of the functions of editing and sound design in filmmaking. It will develop their technical skills. It will enhance their communications skills.

Assignment 3: Reflective Interview

Description:

This assignment will involve a fifteen-minute interview with the course coordinator at the end of the subject. The interview will encourage students to assess their level of knowledge and understanding of film production, as well as their own learning processes. It will be structured around a series of questions that will be provided in advance. Students are strongly encouraged to keep a record of their experiences during the course to help them prepare for this assignment.

Assessment Criteria:

1. Fulfilling the task in a direct, relevant and complete manner.

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- 2. Demonstration of engagement with ideas and materials discussed in FILM 222.
- 3. Quality and originality of responses to the assigned questions, including evidence of preparation.
- 4. The ability to reflect on the course in an intelligent, considered and insightful manner.
- 5. Ability to express yourself in an articulate manner.

Relationship to Learning Objectives:

This assignment will allow students to demonstrate their knowledge and critical understanding of their own creativity, the key creative roles in film production, and the technical dimensions of filmmaking. It will also improve their communication skills.

PENALTIES AND EXTENSIONS

Work submitted late without an extension will be penalised two percent per working day. Except under exceptional circumstances, no work will be accepted more than two weeks after the due date unless specific prior arrangements have been made.

Extensions

If you require an extension, you must complete an extension request form (available on your course Blackboard site) prior to the assignment due date. This must be accompanied by relevant documentation (e.g. a doctor's certificate) where appropriate. Extension requests must be submitted to the Course Coordinator. Tutors cannot grant extensions.

MANDATORY COURSE REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible to pass the course you must have a high standard of attendance at workshops (normally at least 75%) and complete all assignments and achieve a 'C' grade overall.
