Class times and locations

Lectures

There are four lecture hours per week taught in three streams as follows:

- 2. Teresa Neches (CRN 17158) 1:10pm to 3:00pm on Thursdays and 11:00am to 12.50pm on Fridays in MY (Murphy) 103.
- 3. Mariana Lazzaro (CRN 17159) 1:10pm to 3:00pm Mondays and Wednesdays in MY (Murphy) 103.

You must remain in your allotted group for the whole course, unless a change is authorised by the Course Co-ordinator. Students must bring the text book and exercise manual to all classes.

Course delivery

This course is delivered through four lectures per week in two two-hour blocks. The lectures (or language classes) will cover grammatical aspects of the Spanish language and the development of written skills, as well as the development of oral linguistic skills and listening comprehension skills. The lectures will require students' active participation in group exercises or activities.

Communication of additional information

The Spanish noticeboard is in the corridor outside the Spanish Seminar Room (VZ 515). Additional information or information on changes will be conveyed to students either via class, noticeboards, Blackboard, or email.

Course content

SPAN 112 is a course for continuing students, which aims at developing further the four skills of oral comprehension, reading comprehension, speaking and writing. It extends the study of elementary grammar to include the forms and simple uses of the present subjunctive.

Learning objectives

The objectives of the course are as follows. Upon completing the course successfully you will be able to:

(i) understand and reproduce in both written and spoken Spanish a wide variety of grammatical structures using a basic vocabulary;

- (ii) communicate simply but effectively in a range of situations connected with daily life;
- (iii) express yourself, orally and in writing, on your activities and interests;
- (iv) read simple written Spanish with relative ease;
- (v) write simple Spanish from dictation;
- (vi) read aloud simple passages with fluency and accurate pronunciation;
- (vii) understand simple Spanish spoken at a reasonable speed;
- (viii) demonstrate some knowledge of aspects of Hispanic culture.

Spanish is, as far as possible, the language used in all contact hours for most activities.

Expected workload

The Humanities and Social Sciences Faculty Committee on Workloads and Assessment has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a 100-level 1-trimester 18-point course should work on average 8 hours per week including contact hours - i.e., in the case of SPAN 112, students should allow for 7 hours of private study outside class time.

Readings

Essential texts: Bill Van Patten, James F. Lee and Terry L. Ballman, ¿Sabías que . . .?: Beginning Spanish, 5th edition (McGraw Hill, 2008). The textbook is accompanied by two workbooks/laboratory manuals.

For the first two weeks of trimester all undergraduate textbooks and student notes will be sold from the Memorial Theatre foyer, while postgraduate textbooks and student notes will be available from the top floor of VicBooks in the Student Union Building, Kelburn Campus. After week two all undergraduate textbooks will be sold from VicBooks and student notes from the Student Notes Distribution Centre on the ground floor of the Student Union Building.

The relevant dates for the pieces of assessed work are detailed in the Course Programme. Corrected work will be handed out in classes. If not collected in class, students will be able to collect it from the SLC Reception area on the 6th floor of Von Zedlitz. Uncollected work will be destroyed 3 months after the date of the final written exam.

The test, written assignments and final examination measure students' competency in objectives (iv) to (vi) inclusive, as specified in section on Learning Objectives. The listening comprehension tests relate to objectives (i) and (ii), and the oral assessment and reading test relate to objective (iii).

Penalties

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme must be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Co-ordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem. The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day.

Please note that no work for assessment will be accepted after 23 October.

Mandatory course requirements

In order to pass SPAN 112, students are required to do the following, unless specific exemptions have been agreed to:

- (i) sit the written test on the date indicated;
- (ii) complete the written assignment by the due date;
- (iii) attend the oral test at the appointed time;
- (iv) sit the 3-hour final written examination.

Note that attendance at the oral tutorials is not a mandatory course requirement; nevertheless 5% of your final grade depends upon attending a minimum of 8 of these classes. A lower attendance will result in a reduced mark.

Presentation of assignments

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for corrections: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write on alternate lines (or double space if typing). Do not write in pencil. All assignments must include a cover sheet available from SLC Reception. Assignments are to be handed in to the Spanish Programme assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Reception area on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz. Please note that up to a maximum of 5% may be deducted for poorly presented assignments.

Student representatives and student evaluations

In the second week of lectures, staff will facilitate the election of a class representative. Student representatives are a valuable means of communication between teaching staff and students. In addition students can approach any member of staff individually to talk about the course as a whole, any particular aspect of it, or their own individual progress.

At the end of the course students may be asked to fill out questionnaires prepared by the University's Teaching and Development Centre. These questionnaires relate either to the course, or to an individual lecturer's contribution. They are an important part of the University's accountability process, and the results are helpful in the University's attempts to maintain and raise the standards of the education it offers.

Student club, student activities

All students of Spanish are encouraged to join the Spanish Club and to participate in the social and cultural events organised. A noticeboard for the Spanish Students' Club is in the Spanish library (VZ 606). Spanish newspapers and magazines are available in the Spanish Library and may be taken away, but should be signed for in the book, which is held in the Library.

Language Learning Centre (LLC)

The Language Learning Centre (Level 0, von Zedlitz Building) facilitates independent learning and supports the teaching of languages. The LLC is a friendly and supportive environment where you can immerse yourself in language and culture through access to a variety of multimedia language resources: everything from print, audio, DVDs, comprehensive computer software and access to live satellite TV in several languages.

Enjoy the freedom to choose and direct your own learning: you select the materials and activities that you find interesting, which help you meet your needs and suit your learning style. Make time to study at the LLC regularly and you will reap the rewards of higher academic success.

Come and visit the centre at any time for advice and assistance, and to study. It is open year-round, with extended hours during university semesters.

The Peer Assisted Study Support (PASS)

The Peer Assisted Study Support (PASS) programme offers informal weekly study groups in core courses. Led by students who have recently excelled in the course, PASS complements the formal teaching programme. Rather than giving answers, study group Leaders encourage active learning, helping you to develop effective strategies for success at university. Sign-up online in Week 2 (times will be posted on Blackboard): log in to Career Hub, then go to 'Events (Other) to select your PASS time; PASS begins in Week 3.
