PAPER PRESCRIPTION

2013 Offering: Extended Techniques. Supervised workshop and performance opportunities for fourth-year instrumental and composition students in which they may explore unconventional, unorthodox, or non-traditional techniques with musical instruments in seeking to produce an expanded range of instrumental timbres.

TEACHING LEARNING SUMMARY

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students who successfully complete this paper will be able to:

- 1. Employ extended instrumental techniques to perform original compositions and/or Twentieth-Century concert music and/or improvised music, and/or in the composition of original instrumental/vocal works.
- 2. Develop a range of extended techniques on their instrument (or for composers, instrument(s) of their choosing) and where notation is unavailable, formulate appropriate notation for those techniques.
- 3. Work collaboratively with other students to develop extended instrumental techniques.

ASSESSMENT REQUIREMENTS

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are 4 items of assessment:

- 1. Critical Journal / Commentary: Students will submit 4 (four) journals (c. 500 words each) offering commentary and critical reflection on selected models and on their own practice within this paper. Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (20%)
- 2. Collaborative Project: Students will collaborate with one or more students from a different discipline(s) [improvising musician / classical musicians / composers / sound artists] to produce a performance (not more than 10 minutes). The performance will be accompanied by a brief programme note (c. 500 words) to explain the processes used to arrive at the final performance. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (30%)
- 3. Individual project: Students will prepare and perform/record a work making use of techniques explored in the paper. This will be acompanied by a brief essay (c. 2000 words) discussing the techniques used in the work and the historical (or para-disciplinary) precedents for their use. Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (30%)
- 4. Annotated bibliography to accompany the individual project: Examining use of extended techniques as discussed in the paper. (c. 2000 words). Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (20%)
