COURSE PRESCRIPTION

An introduction to reading, speaking, writing and understanding Samoan with emphasis on spoken language skills.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

The study of the Samoan language can give an insight into Samoan thought and culture, and the material read during the course sheds light on Samoan society. The main focus of this course will be on speaking, reading, writing with emphasis on speaking Samoan. This will be at a basic level at first, but by the time students complete the subsequent language course 101 they will have read and should be able, with a dictionary to understand basic Samoan texts. This course has two main objectives, and each is of equal importance.

Students who pass the course should:

- * have a basic understanding and appreciation of the Samoan language, and some experience of reading Samoan.
- * have the necessary level of competence to take SAMO 102 in the second half year.

- 1. Able to appreciate & understand the relationship between the language and culture of fa'asāmoa.
- 2. Able to use skills and knowledge to grow in understanding Samoan society & its place in the modern world.

- 4. Able to relate knowledge of fa'asāmoa to challenges and provide solutions in cross-cultural arenas.

- 2. Demonstrate awareness in making creative connections between a Samoan identity and cultural realities within NZ social settings.
- 3. Demonstrates an appreciation of the value of Samoan oral traditions such as poetry, music and oral arts such as oratory in modern applications.

Communication

- 1. Demonstrate ability to express self competently and confidently in writing and speaking in the Samoan language in a variety of social settings.
- 2. Able to use appropriate register of spoken language for appropriate social situations.
- 3. Able to apply knowledge of fa'asāmoa in making considered responses from a Samoan point of view.
- 4. Ability to critique public attitudes and perceptions from a Samoan perspective.

Leadership

- 1. Ability to negotiate and mediate between family, community and Samoan society at large.
- 2. Initiative to conduct and lead in issues of importance affecting Samoan community in relation to wider community in New Zealand and diaspora.
- 3. Demonstrate responsibility in taking care of the relationships between Samoan and other New Zealanders —teu le vafealoa'i (look after the relationships).

Other

1. Ability to make informed decisions that reflect awareness of issues that impact on a smooth and safe transition in New Zealand.

LECTURE ATTENDANCES

Lecture attendance is a mandatory requirement for SAMO 101. Therefore, you are required to attend at least 80% of lectures. A class roll will be kept.

SAMO 101 will be participating in Samoan Language Week @ Victoria University Library week long celebrations. Through participation and observation, your task is to write a writing assessment in gagana Sāmoa of no more than 150 words on the use of gagana Sāmoa at Samoan Language Week events at Victoria University. Emphasis will be focussed on sentence structure, correct use of the macron and glottal stops, and vocabulary. This assessment is due on the **6**th **of June**. Hard copy to be submitted to 6 Kelburn Parade.

c) In Course Test

This test will take place in the class session. Details of the test will be given out during class.

2. Oral Test 20%

An oral test will be held towards the end of the course. Students must pass this in order to pass mandatory course requirements. This will take place on: **Wednesday 22 May 2013**. Topics and written preparation required for the test will be announced in class.

3. Mafutaga/Weekend Language Camp 10%

All students in Samoan 101 are required to spend one Saturday at a Language camp or Mafutaga. The weekend provides opportunities to gain insight into some of the customs and practices associated with a Samoan environment. Oral skills will receive a major focus during this weekend. This will take place on: *Saturday 11 May 2013.*

Final Examination 40%

A final exam of 3 hours length will be held during the examination period 14 June - 3 July 2013. The exact date and time will be conveyed to students after the trimester break. It is compulsory for you to attend an examination at any time during the examination period.

WORKLOAD

In line with faculty recommendations, it is expected that you should devote, on average 13 hours a week to this course. This includes attendance particularly at lectures, tutorials and language laboratory work as well as preparation for classes, assignment preparation and the examinations. In language learning particularly at this level, vocabulary acquisition is a very important component. Learn at least 10 new words a day is a good rule of thumb to start with.

- 6. Complete **ALL** assignments detailed above.

PENALTIES

Assignments handed in after the due date must be accompanied by a medical certificate or other evidence of exceptional circumstances, to be considered for grading. Information on penalty arrangements will be included with detailed instructions for the exercise. Written assignments should be handed into Va'aomanū Pasifika office at 6KP, or dropped into the assignment box outside the office door by the due date/time. Emailed or faxed assignments will not be accepted except by special arrangement with the lecturer. Late assignments will not be accepted except by special arrangement with the lecturer. If you have special circumstances, you MUST request an extension BEFORE the assignment is due. Make sure to
