An introduction to key techniques and concepts in instrumental/vocal composition and sonic arts. Students apply and learn these skills through a series of short compositions and sound-based works. - 1. demonstrate a basic competency as composers, and become aware of the demands and requirements of composition as a profession
- 2. show an awareness of musical structure and form
- 3. have developed an awareness of the range of compositional possibilities in terms of musical style and expression
- 4. engage with introductory music technology (e.g., sequencing, music notation, digital audio workstations)
- 5. notate their musical ideas in some graphical form for interpretation by a performer or performers.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises one 2-hour lecture per week, one 1.5-hour workshop per week, and one 1-hour lab/tutorial per week. During tutorials, a graduate tutor will guide students in discussion of course readings and/or set works, or assist with/give feedback on work in progress, where appropriate. During workshops, classes will come together to listen to student performances, as well as presentations by staff and guest artists.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this course (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this course
- c) attend at least 9 of the Composer Workshops held during the term of enrolment in this paper.

WORKLOAD

A 15-point one-trimester paper should require at least 150 hours' work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 10 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments. Of the total 150 hours' work, you should expect to spend about 70 hours working on/completing assignments.
