Prescription

CRIM 212 examines the nature, causes and characteristics of criminal offending in New Zealand. The course will draw on analytical skills acquired in CRIM 211, by linking criminological perspectives to particular types of criminal behaviour. The course will also supply students with an overview of criminal justice responses to crime and disorder in New Zealand.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the nature and types of offending in New Zealand;
- 2. Critically evaluate the key theories and concepts associated with a range of crime types;
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of the criminal justice system and associated services in New Zealand.

Teaching format

The course combines lectures and class discussions in a format that aims to guide students through the major topic areas. There will be opportunity and encouragement for you to express your views and knowledge. Tutorial questions and topics will be posted on Blackboard.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Sit the in-class test,
- 2. Submit the essay,
- 3. Sit the two-hour exam, and
- 4. Attend at least 7 tutorials.

Workload

Taking into account class attendance of three hours a week (lectures and tutorials), reading, preparing for assignments and so on, you should spend about 13 hours a week working for CRIM 212 (the expectations are that students will work 10 hours per point, therefore a 20 point course equates to 200 hours over the trimester). You are expected to **complete the readings** in the student notes relating to each session and be prepared to take an active part in discussions in tutorials.

In-Class Test

Weighting 20%

This test is designed so that students can demonstrate their understanding of the nature and types of offending in New Zealand. The test will take place in the usual lecture session.

Trimester Two 2014 CRIM 212

Short Essay (2250-2500 words)

Weighting 40%

Due: 4pm, 19 September

This essay allows students to critically evaluate key theories and concepts related to crimes in New Zealand. Students must pick **one** of the following essay 'questions' and **draw upon criminological theoretical perspectives** in their answer:

- 1. Critically discuss the idea that there was a 'golden era' when few crimes occurred in New Zealand.
- 2. What is the relationship between alcohol and crime in New Zealand? Discuss this question with particular reference to **either** gender **or** age.
- 3. 'Beyond its illegality, illicit drug use does not cause crime in New Zealand'. Critically discuss this statement.
- 4. With a focus on **either** children **or** women **or** Māori, provide explanations for the extent and nature of family violence in New Zealand.
- 5. 'Rape and sexual violence are still silenced in New Zealand'. Critically discuss this statement.
- 6. Critically examine the societal and structural factors that have influenced gang formation and membership in New Zealand. Do recent attempts to stem the perceived 'gang problem' address these factors?
- 7. Critically evaluate the nature of **either** corporate crime **or** state crime in New Zealand.
- 8. 'An environmental crime is an unauthorised act or omission that violates the law'. Critically discuss this statement using examples from New Zealand to support your argument.

Final Examination Weighting 40%

Length: 2 hours

Date: TBA. During the exam period 24 October to 15 November 2014

In completing the examination, students are expected to demonstrate an understanding and knowledge of the key theories and concepts associated with the criminal justice system in New Zealand (ie, the material covered in the second half of the course). Further information will be given at a later date.

Submission and return of work

All written work should be placed in the essay box on the 9th floor of the Murphy building or sent to the course co-ordinator at the Institute of Criminology, Victoria University of Wellington, PO Box 600, Wellington 6140 by courier or registered mail postmarked **no later than 4pm on the due date**. Essays will be returned within tutorial times. Marked assignments can be collected at the Murphy 9th floor reception desk, between **2.00 and 4.00 pm only** from Monday to Friday.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

Assignments must be handed in by the due date. You are expected to keep to this deadline, as otherwise it is unfair to other students. Extensions will be granted only in exceptional circumstances, and should be sought from the course coordinator **prior** to the deadline. An example of an exceptional circumstance would be illness supported by a letter from a medical practitioner. Please note that lack of organisation, word-processing failures and other work demands are not "good reasons".

Penalties

Late submission of work without permission will be penalised by the following deductions:

One grade = period up to and including 24 hours past due date.

Two grades = period from 24 hours up to and including 72 hours past due date.

Work that is handed in later than 72 hours without permission will not be accepted.

Students are advised that failure to keep to the word limit can result in examiners refusing to read that part of the assignment in excess of the word limit. You must provide a word total on the cover sheet for the assignment.
