PRESCRIPTION

This course looks at some of the most important writers who came to prominence during the 1930s or who made their mark on that decade. It will be particularly concerned with the politics of the era and will consider how writers reacted to such events as the Depression, the Spanish Civil War and the rise of fascism.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES (CLOS)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- have a familiarity with some of the more important texts written by British writers during the
 1930s
- 2) situate these texts within their historical context.

TEACHING FORMAT

All classes will be seminars.

MANDATORY COURSE REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- Submit the essays and assignments, on or by the specified dates (subject to such provisions as are stated for late submission of work)
- Sit the examination
- Attend all the seminars

WORKLOAD

The expected workload for a 30-point course is 300 hours over the trimester or 20 hours per teaching week.
