Prescription

A study of ancient Greek, assuming basic reading skills, with emphasis on the reading of texts in Attic Greek.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. demonstrate knowledge of the basic vocabulary, morphology, and grammar of ancient Greek;
- 2. identify and discuss linguistic concepts pertaining to ancient Greek.

Teaching format

This course is taught via a seminar format in which the lecturer explains Greek grammar, vocabulary, and translation. Students participate fully in all activities, including reading and translating sentences and passages and writing answers on the whiteboard. Students are expected to bring all homework exercises, completed in advance, to class.

Mandatory course requirements

There are no mandatory course requirements for this course.

Workload

Students should expect to spend a total of two hundred hours for this course, or sixteen hours and forty minutes per week.
