PRESCRIPTION

Advanced study in a topic in composition that pertains to both Instrumental/Vocal Composition and Sonic Arts. 2014 Offering: An in-depth examination of the main timbrally focused compositional approaches that have developed over the last 50 years in the realms of both instrumental/vocal music and sonic art. Composers examined include Salvatore Sciarrino, Helmut Lachenmann and the Spectralists, and others who have explored 'micro-universes' of sound. Co-taught with CMPO 306.

PAPER LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper will be able to:

- 1. evaluate and discuss critically the primary timbrally focused compositional approaches that have emerged in the last 50 years, with a high level of sophistication
- 2. evaluate critically issues in the use of timbre as a primary compositional material within their own creative work
- 3. analyse rigorously the role of timbre and gesture in a selected composition
- 4. employ, to a high level of sophistication, timbrally focused sonic materials and techniques in a creative work
- 5. explore, in a disciplined and coherent manner, extended techniques and timbral transformation of acoustic instruments.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises one 2-hour lecture and one 1-hour lecture per week, and one 1.5-hour workshop per week. One-on-one supervision of student projects may also be organized during lecture times. During workshops, classes will come together to listen to student performances, as well as presentations by staff and guest artists.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures
- c) attend at least 9 Composer Workshops held during the term of enrolment in this paper.

WORKLOAD

A 30-point one-trimester paper should require at least 300 hours' work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments. It is recommended that students spend at least 100 hours of this time preparing the assignments.

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are 6 items of assessment:

- 1. Journal (6 entries, of up to 500 words each). Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (10%)
- 2. Proposal and portfolio of precompositional materials (for Creative Project 1), 3–5 pages. Related to learning outcomes 4 & 5. (5%)
- 3. Creative Project 1 (5–7 minutes). Related to learning outcomes 4 & 5. (25%)
- 4. Proposal and portfolio of precompositional materials (for Creative Project 2), 3–5 pages. Related to learning outcomes 4 & 5. (5%)
- 5. Creative Project 2 (4–7 minutes). Related to learning outcomes 4 & 5. (30%)
- 6. Analytical essay (2,500 words). Related to learning outcome 3. (25%)
