# **COMMUNICATION OF ADDITIONAL INFORMATION**

#### **PRESCRIPTION**

A detailed exploration of one or more critical approaches to opera in relation to a particular selection of operatic works. 2014 Offering: This course will explore politics, identity, and subjectivity in Verdi's operas. Examining his operas both in their historical context and as they are experienced in performance, we will attempt to come to terms with the way the composer's works interacted with, and helped to create, a new concept of Italian national identity in part through redefining the experience of the individual. Issues to investigate will include the role of conventions in Verdi's operatic language, and how basic terms of operatic communication - voice, body, plot, musical text, staging - function to create meaning in the operas. Co-taught with MUSC 308.

#### PAPER LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper will be able to:

- 1. demonstrate a detailed knowledge of the operas studied
- 2. evaluate relevant scholarly and critical literature, and demonstrate an in-depth understanding of the critical approaches relevant to this repertoire
- 3. present work that articulates their own critical approach in relation to one or more operatic works, and contextualises that approach in relation to relevant scholarship.

### **TEACHING FORMAT**

This course comprises one 3-hour lecture/seminar discussion per week.

#### MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each piece of work or item of assessment specified for this course, on or by the specified dates (subject to such provisions as are stated for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures, tutorials and workshops related to this course
- c) attend at least two Music Forum seminar presentations in the term the course is taught.

# **WORKLOAD**

A 30-point one-trimester paper should require at least 300 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Attendance at lectures/seminars across the semester comprises 36 hours of work. In general, students should plan on spending at least 12 hours per week during term time (starting in Week 2, so 132 hours) in basic class preparation, which will include the work on your reading/listening journals. Significant work on the final project should begin over the mid-term break; the final critical research essay should require around 100 hours of work, with an additional 30 hours for the preparatory assignment and seminar presentation.

#### **ASSESSMENT**

### Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are four items of assessment:

- 1. A portfolio of reading/listening journals of informal writing (8-12 entries, 500 words each). Related to learning outcomes 1-2. (35%).
- 2. Essay preparation. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (10%).
- 3. Critical research essay (5,000 words). Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (45%).
- 4. Formal seminar presentation. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (10%).

### SUBMISSION AND RETURN OF WORK

All Reading/Listening Journals should be submitted via Blackboard by the specified due date; in case of any errors in the Blackboard submissions system, students are responsible for keeping a Hard Copy, with a time/date stamp on it of all journal entries submitted until the conclusion of the trimester.

The essay preparatory assignment should be submitted in hard copy in class, or in the course coordinators mail box in the Kelburn foyer area. The final essay should be submitted electronically. Marked assignments will be returned in CLASS; the final essay will be returned via email. Assignments will normally be marked and returned as soon as possible, within three weeks of the date of submission.

NB: This course is moderated, so all students are requested to retain all marked assessment items in the event that they are required at the end of the course.

#### **EXTENSIONS AND PENALTIES**

Assignments must be submitted by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, assessment submitted after 5pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue.

Students, who for exceptional reasons can justify an extension for an item of assessment, must apply to the Course Coordinator *before* the due date.
