PRESCRIPTION

Advanced study of a topic in Ethnomusicology, centred on selected cultural issues and musical practices and considered from a range of social, cultural and critical perspectives. 2014 Offering: This course examines approaches to research in ethnomusicology and in particular explores the study of globalisation and popular music. By critically examining a variety of global musics and individuals, and understanding the local cultural contexts of the music, the course addresses such issues as technology, mediation and commercialisation, musical value and aesthetics, crosscultural collaborations, and 'world music'. Class discussions and projects explore the interpretation and understanding of popular musics in a range of cultural and social contexts. Co-taught with MUSC 354.

PAPER LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper/course will be able to:

- 1. identify and explain at an advanced level a range of global popular musics in their historical, cultural, and social contexts
- 2. critically evaluate at an advanced level contemporary theories and perspectives about globalisation and the importance of these ideas to understanding music
- 3. generate new advanced critical work in music and culture employing advanced skills in scholarly research and academic writing.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises one 1-hour lecture and one 2-hour lecture per week.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this paper/course (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this paper/course
- c) attend at least two Music Forum seminar presentations in the trimester the paper/course is taught.

WORKLOAD

A 30-point one-trimester paper should require at least 300 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments. You should plan to spend 36 hours in lectures, 100 hours completing course readings, and an additional 144 hours completing assessment items.

ASSESSMENT

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are five items of assessment:

- 1. Writing portfolio of 8-10 informal responses to readings, listening, and discussions (500-600 words each). Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (30%).
- 2. Test. Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (15%).
- 3. Seminar Presentation (leading discussion). Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (10%).
- 4. Oral Presentation of Research. Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (10%).
- 5. Essay (including preparatory work) maximum 5,000 words. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (35%).
