PRESCRIPTION

Advanced critical and analytical study of jazz, developing competency in a range of research methods. 2014 Offering: German record label ECM was responsible for a significant European reinvention of jazz during the first 40 years of its operation. This course explores the nature of that reinvention and the music and musicians responsible for those developments. Students will explore the music of artists including Keith Jarrett, Jan Garbarek, Edward Vesala, Tomasz Stanko and Anouar Brahem. Class discussion will be supplemented by reading from a wide range of sources and perspectives both on contemporary jazz and European cultural contexts. Co-taught with MUSC 327.

Students who successfully complete this paper/course will be able to:

- 1. evaluate scholarly and biographical literature and apply findings to their own work
- 2. critically examine musical recordings and draw conclusions about aesthetic considerations at play in their creation
- 3. present creative and/or critical work that reveals burgeoning research skills.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises one 2-hour and one 1-hour lecture per week.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this paper/course (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this paper/course
- c) attend at least two Music Forum seminar presentations in the trimester the course is taught.

WORKLOAD

A 30-point one-trimester paper should require at least 300 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

For this course to work properly I need you to read and listen to the set materials <u>before</u> class each week. This is so we can talk about the issues and ideas these papers, book chapters and recordings throw up in class, rather than wasting time in our sessions together absorbing the content, something you can easily do at home in your own time. We have 3 hours per week in class. In addition, I expect you will need to spend about 4 hours a week reading, perhaps 3 hours per week listening, leaving up to 10 hours a week to work on your various assignments and major projects (there is something due every week). This music and the ideas around it are wonderful, but to really dig down into them it is going to require this kind of commitment from you. It's up to you of course, but to make the most of what this course has to offer you'll need to meet me in the middle – and I'll be putting in around 20 hours a week to make the paper as good as I can.

ASSESSMENT

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are 5 items of assessment:

- 1. A suite of listening/reading journals (c. 3,000 words total). Related to learning outcome 2. (20%)
- 2. A critical discography examining the work of an artist with a substantial (5 or more recordings) ECM oeuvre (c. 1,500 words). Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (10%)
- 3. Annotated bibliography focused on the work of three representative ECM artists (c. 1,500 words). Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2. (10%)
- 4. A mix-tape [CD] of up to 8 tracks (recordings) from the ECM catalogue with accompanying liner notes that draw links between the performances on the mixtape/disc and key aesthetic values associated with the ECM label. (c. 2,000 words). Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (20%)
- 5. Final Project: Essay exploring one or more of the central issues discussed in this paper (c.
- 4,000-6,000 words). Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (40%)
