PRESCRIPTION

A broad introduction to the methodologies, practices and applications of music pedagogy for advanced musicians . 2014 Offering: A broad introduction to the methodologies, practices and applications of music pedagogy suitable for advanced musicians. This course explores concepts of teaching and learning music, and provides an opportunity for students to gain practical experience of planning, delivering and evaluating musical learning within an educational context. This paper will be of interest to musicians with an interest in education as well as those whose aspiration is to become a career music educator.

PAPER LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper/course will be able to:

1. communicate a broad range of methodologies appropriate to the practice of music pedagogy in the community or a studio teaching environment

2. demonstrate the skills necessary for teaching the practical acquisition of musical expertise in a variety of contexts

3. develop and critically evaluate a compendium of key materials for the teaching of music at the beginning and intermediate levels for at least one particular field/instrument.

TEACHING FORMAT

Each week during the trimester we will meet for a seminar (noon to 12.50pm on Mondays) and a workshop (noon to 1.50pm on Wednesdays). Although various kinds of learning will take place in each of these sessions, as a rule the workshops will be primarily practical and the seminars primarily discursive

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this course (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this course
- c) attend at least two Music Forum seminar presentations in the term the course is taught.

WORKLOAD

A 30-point one-trimester paper should require at least 300 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Over the course of the trimester you should expect to spend 66 hours reading texts and completing journal entries. A similar amount of time should be spent preparing the presentation and associated materials. Approximately 132 hours should be spent preparing and writing the final project.

ASSESSMENT

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are 3 items of assessment:

1. Portfolio of 8-10 journal entries (500 words each), in relation to both reading and practice. Related to leaning outcomes 1 & 2. (25%)

2. Practicum and/or seminar presentation. Related to learning outcomes 2 & 3. (25%)

3. Final project, including preparatory materials and bibliography (5,000 words). Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (50%)

SUBMISSION AND RETURN OF WORK

Assignments should be submitted by email.

Marked assignments will be returned by email.

NB: This course is moderated, so all students are requested to retain all marked assessment items in the event that they are required at the end of the course.

EXTENSIONS AND PENALTIES

Assignments must be submitted by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, assessment submitted after 5pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue.

Where a student has submitted fewer than eight journal entries, the mark for the journal portfolio component will be reduced proportionately. (For example, four entries will receive half the credit awarded to eight entries of the same quality.)

Students, who for exceptional reasons can justify an extension for an item of assessment, must apply to the Course Coordinator *before* the due date. Please note that no extensions can be granted for tutorial assignments.

ASSIGNMENT PRESENTATION
