PRESCRIPTION

A detailed examination of a large-scale research project recently or currently undertaken by a music therapy staff member. The paper will explore methodology, methods, ethics and the development of research proposals.

- 3. demonstrate the analytic and academic skills and sufficient subject knowledge required to develop a clear and well-written research proposal.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises six three-hour lectures, delivered fortnightly, on the dates and times as listed above.

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a. submit the assessment specified for this course, on or by the specified dates (subject to such provisions as are stated for late submission of work)

WORKLOAD

A 15-point one- paper should require at least 150 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 10 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments. Overall it is anticipated that students will spend 18hours attending classes, and approximately 18hours reading and preparing for classes, 70hours searching databases and reading research literature relevant to their assignments, 40hours (10 + 10 + 20) writing up their first three assignments, and 4hours tidying up their course files.

ASSESSMENT

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

Students will be required to:

- 1. Prepare a (2,000 word) paper which summarises a) the theories that underpin the research methodology of the project under discussion b) the research process, and c) some of the methods that are used in the project.(20%) Related to learning outcome 1.
- 2. Complete a NZ HDEC application based on the study under examination. Related to learning outcome 2. (20%)
- 3. Submit an ongoing 'course file' as part of the continuous assessment for this paper. This includes, lecture notes, questions, reflective ideas, musical examples, notes of reading and contributions to class that have been part of your ongoing study for this paper. The requirement is not in addition to current studies but reflective of what students have been doing in an ongoing way to support their studies. Related to learning outcomes 1, 2 and 3. (20%)
- 4. Develop a (3,000 word) research proposal which either a) builds on the music therapy research studied; OR b) focuses on another music therapy research question (in consultation with the lecturer. Related to learning outcome 3. (40%)
