TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises two 1.5-hour lectures per week.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete the assessment specified for this course, on or by the specified dates (subject to such provisions as are stated for late completion of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of rehearsals
- c) organise a substitute player for every absence from a rehearsal. If a substitute is not organised, 5% will be deducted from the final year's mark for each absence which is not covered.

WORKLOAD

A 15-point one-trimester paper should require at least 150 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 10 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

New features of PERF 223 include the ensemble transcribing of a classic fusion album to then be work-shopped and performed. This happens in the first six weeks of the paper, followed by performance and rehearsal of the students' arrangements.

ASSESSMENT

- 1. Contribution to ensemble rehearsals and performance. Related to learning outcomes 1, 3 and

- 2. Transcriptions 1 and 2. Related to learning outcomes 2 and 4. (20%)
- 3. Final performance. Related to learning outcomes 1, 3 and 4. (60%)
