## **Prescription**

An examination of philosophical debate on consciousness and personal identity.

## **Course learning objectives (CLOs)**

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1. demonstrate an in depth understanding of a variety of debates in the fields of philosophy of mind and philosophy of psychology
- 2. critically evaluate a variety of arguments in the fields of philosophy of mind and philosophy of psychology using established methods of formal or informal logic
- analyse or elucidate complex ideas and concepts in the field of philosophy of mind and philosophy of psychology

## **Teaching format**

This course will involve two two-hour lectures per week. There are no tutorials for this course. Students are expected to attend classes regularly, take part in class discussion, and to keep up with the readings.

## **Mandatory course requirements**

Other than obtaining an overall passing mark there are no mandatory course requirements.

#### Workload

In accordance with Faculty Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 200 hours to the course throughout the trimester. An approximate indication of the hours to be spent on each component of the course is as follows:

## **Extensions and penalties**

#### **Extensions**

Make-up quizzes will not be given, although the lowest two quiz grades will be dropped for each student. For essays, all extensions must be obtained from the course coordinator, prior to the deadline for submission of the assessment task unless unforeseeable circumstances prevent this. Short extensions of up to 3 days will be automatically granted to any student who requests it with an email prior to the scheduled deadline. Longer extensions need to be negotiated and require justification and supporting evidence. Any work submitted late without an extension having been obtained is subject to penalties (see below).

#### **Penalties**

Philosophy Programme policy stipulates that late submission of essays is penalised. Late essays submitted without extensions having been obtained will receive a penalty of 5 points per day (or part thereof) late. No essay will be accepted after 12 November 2014.
