Prescription

An examination of the life, teaching and activity of Jesus of Nazareth, as presented in the New Testament gospels and viewed against the historical, religious and political backdrop of first-century Palestine.

Course content

The course consists of five units, which will be covered in lectures, tutorials, assignments, and in your own reading.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

At the end of the course, students should be able to:

- 1 locate the ministry of Jesus in its proper historical context, and to explain those features of first-century Palestinian Judaism that emerge in the text of the gospels;
- explain the distinctive character and structure of Mark's narrative, and the historical and theological significance of the fourfold gospel witness;
- 3 summarise and critically evaluate the fruits of modern gospel scholarship, with reference to a range of contemporary publications;
- 4 appreciate the significance of the "Christ-event" for shaping the Christian concept of God.

Teaching format

This course is delivered through a combination of lectures and tutorials.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) Submit the written work specified for this course, on or by the specified dates (subject to such provisions as are stated for late submission of work);
- b) Attend at least 80% of tutorials.

Workload

For a 20 point course an average student should spend 200 hours across the trimester,13 hours for preparation, reading and writing in addition to attendance at lectures and tutorials.

Assessment

Rationale for assessment: The assessment of this course relates directly to these objectives.

The essays allow students to apply their analytical skills to information retrieved through library research on a set topic. Essays demonstrate the students' level of proficiency in finding, understanding, and using sources. They develop the skills of critical reading, analysis and organizing material necessary for

continued study. The process also gives the opportunity to develop more in-depth knowledge of an area covered in the lectures and weekly readings.

The short written responses test comprehension of the major ideas covered in weekly lectures and in class reader and Stanton's book.

The test allows students to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of the material presented in the course and provides the opportunity to reflect on their learning process throughout the term.

Students who do not understand the grades they have been assigned or are concerned about any matter relating to the course should see the course co-ordinator, John Dennison.

Submission and return of work

Essays are to be submitted electronically to Blackboard. Feed-back and marks for essays shall be posted on Blackboard within 2 weeks of submission.

Extensions and penalties

Penalties

Penalties for late essays / assignments:

- 2 per cent per 24 hours will be deducted for late essays
- Essays submitted late due to medical reasons must be given to the programme administrator accompanied by a doctor's or other appropriate certification.

If a student requires an extension for any serious or medical reason they must apply for one as soon as practicably possible before the due date of the assessment in question
