Prescription

This course will be an in-depth discussion of one or more problems in contemporary philosophical logic. Topics will change from year to year, but they may include vagueness, theories of truth, modal logic applied to problems in philosophy, or the philosophy of mathematics.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1. read and understand a wide range of material in philosophy of logic and the philosophy of mathematics;
- 2. produce original arguments about these topics that either attack or defend some controversial position;
- 3. construct their own theories in the philosophy of logic or philosophy of mathematics.

Teaching format

This is an independent study course. Students and the lecturer will together select appropriate readings for the topic in philosophical logic chosen by the student. Students will meet with the lecturer to discuss the readings and to choose a narrower topic for the students' essays. The students will then write a short essay of approximately 1500 words to give a literature survey of this narrower field. Then they will write a longer essay of approximately 3500 words critically assessing some aspect of this literature.

Mandatory course requirements

There are no mandatory course requirements.

Workload

This course has been designed on the assumption that students will devote approximately 150 hours to it throughout the trimester. This is an average of 11 hours per week across the 14 weeks of trimester. This includes attendance at 12 lectures. The remainder of your time will need to be shared doing active reading and writing essays.
