

Course Prescription

This course introduces students to the historical foundations, beliefs and practices of Rastafarianism, Vodou, Santeria and religious traditions of Africa. Themes include the history and development of these traditions, their ritual expressions in Africa and the diaspora, and their concepts of health, healing and divination.

- 4. demonstrate skills in research and in the presentation of findings.

Course learning objectives (CLOs) RELI 310

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- demonstrate detailed knowledge of the content of African religious traditions, important for developing 'religious literacy' in our globalizing world
- communicate interpretations of primary data historical, textual, ethnographic, etc. that demonstrate an understanding of, and sensitivity towards, complex religious contexts and traditions
- 3. evaluate scholarly arguments about African religions, advancing a critical and independent perspective
- 4. demonstrate skills in in-depth research and in the presentation of findings.

Teaching format

This course is delivered through a combination of lectures and tutorials, and includes readings and assigned work. These components are complementary with one another, not redundant; and ALL components of the course are necessary for students to do well. **The lecture programme** is described in the "Appendix to the Course Outline." Lectures may be changed from time to time. As much notice as possible will be given when changes occur.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. attend at least 70% of tutorials
- 2. submit each piece of assessment
- 3. sit the class test.
