Prescription

A survey of 20th-century art, with emphasis on Europe and America.

Course content

ARTH 219 presents a survey of twentieth-century art. The course has been designed to consider the role of art and artists in modern society. It will explore the individual and collective ambitions of artists, the institutional context of artistic endeavour, as well as the way histories of twentieth century art have been constructed. Given the variety of artistic practice during the twentieth-century, the course will focus on the period between 1900 and 1960.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. analyse and interpret Modern art within the relevant social, political and theoretical contexts;
- 2. gather and organise relevant information and evidence from published material (i.e. secondary sources) and to construct an argument using this material;
- 3. present material which is coherent and well-written and which demonstrates an understanding and application of the conventions of academic writing (including appropriate citation, referencing and documentation);

Teaching format

ARTH 219 consists of 21 one-hour lectures, 9 one-hour tutorials, a bibliographic and essay assignment, and two image-based tests. Please note that tutorials are discussion-based and we expect that you do the reading before your tutorial and come prepared to participate.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. complete and submit the essay specified for the course, on or by the due date;
- 2. sit two image-based tests:
- 3. attend at least six tutorials.

Workload

The University recommends that 200 hours inclusive of lectures and tutorials, be given to a 20-point course in order to maintain satisfactory progress, i.e. 16 hours/week. Please ensure that you are able to set aside at least this amount of time throughout the course.

Typically, you will dedicate 30 hours to attending classes, 40 hours to reading for tutorials, 90 hours to researching and writing your essay, and 40 hours to revising course materials in preparation for the two test.

Assessment

The course is internally assessed by means of one bibliography, one essay and two image-based tests. The two tests will relate to that part of the course immediately preceding them. The essay and bibliography will allow you to range more broadly over the course content. In this way, the assessment should ensure that you have a sound knowledge of as much of the course as possible.

Essay will be marked by your lecturer. A second opinion may be requested in the final assessment of any piece of written work. Marked essays will be available from the Art History office.

Extensions and penalties

Art History has a policy that no extensions will be granted. If you have medical or other problems preventing you from meeting a deadline, you must contact your course coordinator at the earliest opportunity. Without arrangements having been agreed to, late essays will be penalised by the deduction of two percentage points for each day beyond the due date.
