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Prescription and course content

ARTH 408 examines in detail the key issues and debates which are currently informing the interpretation of French art of the 18th century. The course aims to provide critical perspectives on a significant 'moment' in the history of western European art.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. bring a range of critical perspectives to the analysis of key texts
- 2. be familiar with the key works of major artists and be able to evaluate the range of interpretations of their work
- 3. produce a sustained piece of written work that demonstrates familiarity with and consistent application of the conventions of academic writing including scholarly reviews and journal articles
- 4. present informed views both orally in seminars and in written form

Teaching format

This course is taught as a series of 16 two-hour seminars spread over two trimesters. Students are expected to prepare for each seminar by doing the prescribed reading and to participate in the seminar discussions.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. submit one review of a scholarly text
- 2. give one 20-minute seminar presentation
- 3. submit one essay
- 4. attend a minimum of 14 seminars
- 5. sit the final examination

Workload

The University recommends that 300 hours inclusive of contact teaching hours, be given to a 30-point course in order to maintain satisfactory progress.

Contact hours: 35 hours (32 hours of seminars and 3-hour examination);

Preparation for seminars: 65 hours;

Assessment: review (40 hours); seminar presentation (40 hours); essay (60 hours); exam preparation (60 hours)

Assessment

ARTH408 is assessed by means of one review of a scholarly text, one seminar presentation, one essay and a three-hour examination.

Submission and return of work

All assessment items should be given to the course co-ordinator who is responsible for marking all assessment. You may request a second opinion of the assessment of any piece of written work from another lecturer in Art History. Coursework will be reviewed by an external assessor in order to ensure that academic standards at Honours level are met. Your final grade for the course may be adjusted both to reflect your overall contribution to and achievement in the course and in response to the feedback from the external assessor.

Extensions and Penalties

Art History has a policy that extensions will not be granted. If you have medical or other problems preventing you from meeting a deadline you must contact your tutor at the earliest opportunity. Without prior arrangements having been agreed to with the tutor, late essays will be penalised by the deduction of two percentage points for each day beyond the due date.
