### **PRESCRIPTION**

Creative application of intermediate concepts in studio-based sonic arts, as they apply to sonic-temporal design, experience and form, coupled with conceptually and critically informed use of music technology.

#### PAPER LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. demonstrate understanding of intermediate level composition and sound design techniques, and apply these in the creation of original work
- 2. use the creative processes/strategies associated with sonic art and sound design in the creation of original work
- demonstrate critical awareness of their own working processes/strategies, as well as of the contexts in which sonic art is produced and received
- apply basic electronic performance skills, and have publicly performed one or more major works.

#### **TEACHING FORMAT**

This course comprises one 1-hour lecture and one 2-hour lecture per week, and one 1.5-hour workshop per week. During lectures, students are expected to present and discuss their own work, as well as to contribute to discussion of the work of classmates and ideas/works introduced in lectures. During workshops, classes will come together to listen to student performances, as well as presentations by staff and guest artists. Students will publicly present one of their own works in the workshop.

### **MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS**

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this course (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this course
- c) attend at least 9 of the Composer Workshops held during the term of enrolment in this paper
- d) rehearse and publicly perform at least one Creative Project 1, as specified in the assessment regime.

If, for health reasons, you are unable to complete all the work required for assessment purposes for this paper by 2 July, you may, on presentation of a medical certificate, have the date for submission extended by the Director, NZSM.

# WORKLOAD

A 15-point one-trimester paper should require at least 150 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 10 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

# **ASSESSMENT**

# Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are 4 items of assessment:

- 1. Portfolio of one or more major assignments (totalling 6–8 minutes), created using music technology. 50%. Learning outcomes 1–2
- 2. Portfolio of 4–8 short assignments (each max. 90 seconds). 30%. Learning outcomes 1–3
- 3. Live electronic performance of a major work. 10%. Learning outcome 4
- 4. Critical journal (6–10 entries of no more than 500 words per entry). 10%. Learning outcomes 1–4

### **MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT**

Every student requires a computer to complete this paper. It is possible to complete assignments using the computers in EMS2 and the Sonic Arts Lab, if you do not have your own computer. It is essential that you make use of EMS2 for regular assessment of your audio materials, and especially for creating final mixes of your work. Headphones and lo-fi monitoring environments do not provide an accurate indication of the sonic qualities of your audio materials and creative work. Student work may be stored on the EMS server. However, the NZSM is not responsible for backing up student work, and students are strongly advised to use a portable hard drive for transporting and backing up files.
