#### **TEACHING FORMAT**

This course comprises one 2-hour lecture and one 1-hour lecture per week. See attached course syllabus for more information

### MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

#### WORKLOAD

A 20-point one-trimester paper should require at least 200 hours work (including class time).
