Course learning objectives (CLOs)

By the end of CRIM 217 students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Describe a number of different theoretical approaches to understanding crime and explain how they are related to one another (As assessed in assignment 2 and the exam).
- 2. Describe a number of different theories of offending and explain how they contribute to our understanding of criminal behaviour (As assessed in assignment 2 and the exam).
- 3. Apply their knowledge of psychological approaches to understanding crime to a specific case study of offending. (As assessed in assignment 1)
- 4. Describe and critically evaluate a number of different psychological approaches to reducing crime (As assessed in assignment 2 and the exam).

Teaching format

The course includes twelve 2-hour lectures and ten 1-hour tutorials.

Attendance at tutorials is mandatory. In order to meet the mandatory requirements for this course you must attend at least 7 out of 9 tutorials.

Tutorials will start in the second week of trimester.

During the first week, you will be allocated to a tutorial group. Once you have been allocated to one of these groups, you should always attend at that time. If, for any unforeseen reason, you cannot attend your given time one week, then please see the course co-ordinator and you may be able to sit in on another tutorial.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Submit assignment One and Two;
- 2. Attend at least 7 out of 9 tutorials; and
- 3. Sit the final exam.

Workload

You should spend a minimum of 13 hours per week working on CRIM 217. This includes attending class (one two hour lecture per week and one tutorial per week), reading and taking notes, working on assignments, and preparing for final examination. Obviously the time you spend on these activities will vary throughout the trimester and according to your individual study habits, but you might find the following useful in deciding how to allocate your time:
