PRESCRIPTION

This course will familiarise students with some of the most critically acclaimed novels in English published within the last ten years. Issues examined will include the marketing and critical reception of these novels; their narrative strategies in a media-saturated cultural context; and the ways in which they relate to historical forms of realism and anti-realism, with the intersecting ideas of nation, history and cultural identity.

COURSE CONTENT

Students will be expected to read all seven of the prescribed novels and all relevant reviews, interviews, and discussions on the Internet, as well any extra discussion made available on Blackboard.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES (CLOS)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1 display familiarity with all set texts;
- 2 demonstrate an understanding of the cultural context and reception of contemporary fiction;
- discuss and analyse the central issues involved in contemporary fiction with critical awareness and sophistication.

TEACHING FORMAT

The course is taught by two lectures and one tutorial per week

MANDATORY COURSE REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

WORKLOAD

The expected workload for a 20 point course is 200 hours over the trimester or 13 hours per teaching week.

ASSESSMENT

There will be two 2,000 word essays set during the course worth 25% each and a final 3-hour examination worth 50%.

The first essay is due on **16 April,** the second on **14 May.** Essay topics will be available by the second week of term. Essays must be handed in by 5.00 pm on the due date to the English Programme Office, VZ 8th floor.

Students will be expected to write exam questions on at least four of the writers on whom they have **not** written in-term essays. The exam is closed-book.

The examination period is from 14 June – 3 July 2013.

 Each of these essays will meet two of the three learning objectives and partially fulfill the third, to "have a familiarity with all the set texts".
