# Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to

1. understand simple Greek sentences

2. translate simple English sentences into Greek

## **Teaching format**

This course is taught via a seminar format in which the lecturer explains Greek grammar, vocabulary and translation; students participate fully in all activities, including reading and translating sentences and passages and writing answers on the whiteboard. Students are expected to bring all homework exercises, completed in advance, to class.

## **Mandatory course requirements**

There are no mandatory course requirements for this course.

## Workload

Students should expect to spend ca. 16.667 hours per week on GREE 112. Over the entire duration of the course this breaks down to an average of

- 1. 3.5 hours of classes
- 2. 16.667 minutes sitting in-term tests
- 3. 7.1667 hours preparing exercises and readings to be gone over in class
- 4. 3.5 hours learning vocabulary in preparation for assessment
- 5. 2 hours reading and revising grammatical and syntactical points in preparation for assessment
