Prescription

A study of popular revolt, social protest and political sedition in Britain from the sixteenth century to the mid-nineteenth century.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Summarise historiographical debates concerning popular revolt, social protest and political sedition in Britain from the mid-sixteenth century to the mid-nineteenth century
- 2. Differentiate between protest movements over time and space
- 3. Integrate historical research into their own writing via clear and concise prose

Teaching format

HIST 234 will be taught via two 50-minute lectures per week and nine 50-minute tutorials over the course of the trimester.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- Complete the three assessment items (primary source analysis, essay and in-class test), specified for HIST 234, by the specified dates;
- attend at least 7 of 9 tutorials.

Workload

In accordance with Faculty Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 200 hours to HIST 234 throughout the trimester. This includes weekly attendance at lectures, and tutorials, completion of all set weekly readings and research and writing for set assessment tasks. An approximate indication of the hours to be spent on each component of the course is as follows:

Submission and return of work

Essays should be submitted through the office essay drop-off point, Old Kirk Room 405, together with completed cover sheet which is available on Blackboard and/or from the office.

Essays and tests will be returned at times to be advised. If students fail to attend these times, they may collect their essay from the Office, Old Kirk Room 405 between the hours of 1.00 and 2.00 pm from Monday to Friday and must show their Student ID card before collection.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

Extensions may be granted in exceptional circumstances, but **all extensions require the student to provide documentation**. If granted an extension, students must agree to a new due date. Contact your tutor as soon as a problem emerges. Extension forms are available in the History Programme office.

Penalties

History Programme policy stipulates that late submission of essays is penalised. Students lose 5% for the first day late and 2% thereafter for a maximum of 10 working days. After 10 days, work can be accepted for mandatory course requirements but will not be marked.
