Communication of additional information

Prescription

A practical course in oral and written Italian, building on ITAL 114 and 115. Lectures focus on the study of vocabulary, grammar and structures. Tutorials and audio-visual classes focus on oral skills and listening comprehension.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

ITAL 215 is a one trimester, 20-point intermediate course for students who wish to maintain and develop a solid grammatical base and intermediate fluency in the Italian language (broadly in line with mid-B1 level of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages).

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. understand most of the main points of intermediate-level Italian spoken at reasonable speed and clear written Italian related to familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc;
- 2. interact and express themselves at an intermediate level with speakers of Italian and deal with a variety of situations likely to arise while travelling or studying in Italy;
- 3. create simple connected written text on topics that are familiar or of personal interest;
- 4. describe experiences and events and briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.

Aims:

- (i) to revise and develop basic and intermediate Italian grammar, vocabulary and syntax;
- (ii) to expose students to authentic audio-visual and written materials and a virtual immersive Italian environment, enabling them to use the Italian language in everyday life contexts;
- (iii) to present insights into various aspects of contemporary Italian society, and give students the opportunity to express their ideas and opinions in Italian;
- (iv) to help students think critically and creatively about how to achieve effective communication in a second language.

Teaching format

This course is delivered through two lectures, one tutorial/AV class and one virtual language immersion class. The lectures will mainly cover grammatical aspects of the Italian language and the development of intermediate written expression and reading comprehension skills. The tutorial/AV classes will focus on the development of oral linguistic skills and vocabulary and listening comprehension skills. The virtual language immersion class will focus on developing interactive communication skills in simulated real-life environments. All classes require students' active participation in individual and group exercises or activities.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50% students must (unless a specific exemption has been agreed with the course coordinator):

- (i) attend a minimum of 80% of the tutorial/AV classes;
- (ii) attend a minimum of 80% of the virtual language immersion classes;
- (iii) submit the weekly written assignments by the dates indicated;
- (iv) sit the two written tests on the dates indicated;
- (v) sit the two AV tests at the appointed times;
- (vi) do the oral presentation at the appointed time.

Workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. In this **20 point 200 hour course**, students should expect to work on average <u>16</u> hours per week including contact hours (contact hours are 3 hours in weeks 1 and 12, 4 hours in weeks 2-11). In the case of ITAL 215, this means an average of **12.5 hours of private study per week outside class time**. Please note that some students will find they need to do more than this, especially if they are aiming to achieve high grades.

A possible distribution of this private study time each week would be:

Reading and reviewing class notes, grammatical	40% (5 hours per week, or 60 hours over the

vocabulary (including homework exercises)	(Please note that this work is also essential to assessment preparation)

Written, oral and aural practice (including video comprehension exercises)	25% (a little over 3 hours per week, or 40 hours over the trimester)(Please note that this work is also essential to assessment preparation)
Specific assessment preparation (e.g. weekly writing assignments, oral presentation preparation/wiki contributions, test revision)	35% (a little over 4 hours per week, or 50 hours over the trimester)

Please note that the specific assessment workload estimates given above may vary and are based on a student who also completes an additional 60 hours of reading and revision and 36 hours of written, oral and aural practice over the course of the trimester.

Submission and return of work

All assignments must include a cover sheet available from the School of Languages and Cultures (SLC) office on the 6th floor of Von Zedlitz (vZ610). Assignments are to be handed into the Italian assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Office (vZ610). Corrected work will be handed out in class. If you do not collect your work in class, you will be able to collect it from the SLC Office (VZ610) between the hours of 10am and 2pm each day. A Student ID card will need to be shown to collect work.

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for correction: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write on alternate lines. Do not write in pencil.

Extensions and penalties

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme must be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem.

The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day. In addition, please note that up to a maximum of 5% may be deducted for poorly presented assignments.

Please note that no work for assessment will be accepted after 13 June.

The dates of the tests given in the Course Programme must be adhered to. You should always sit a test if humanly possible, obtaining a medical certificate if you wish to claim impairment. If you sit a test but believe your performance has been radically affected by some medical or other factor, inform the Course Co-ordinator immediately. If you fail the test, you may be able to claim impairment. If you are unable to sit a test, for severe medical, personal or family reasons, you should do everything possible to notify the Course Coordinator, if necessary through the Administrator, before the test, or to get a friend or family member to do so on your behalf. Only in cases of severe illness or other exceptionally difficult circumstances, which must normally be documented, can the Programme consider allowing students to sit a test at a different time from that indicated.
