Course prescription

An examination of what is involved in learning first and second languages, including the study of bilingualism, discussing both the sociocultural context of learning and the processes

involved in learning a language.

Course learning objectives

By the end of the course students should be able to:

- i) demonstrate an understanding of the language skills involved in language use
- ii) understand the processes involved in first and second language learning and in bilingual acquisition
- iii) relate this understanding to the contexts in which language learning takes place, and to the motivational factors involved in language learning
- iv) represent and interpret data from a language learning context
- v) examine and evaluate approaches to language learning and teaching, including in the New Zealand context.

Teaching format

The course has **three** lectures a week and **one** tutorial. Tutorials are compulsory and form an essential part of all Linguistics courses. It is expected that students will prepare for and attend all of their scheduled tutorials. You should inform your tutor if you are unable to attend a tutorial, and arrange to attend at another time if at all possible.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a. Make a satisfactory attempt at *all* assessment components. "Satisfactory" means that where they have not reached a C- standard, they must nevertheless reflect the fact that the assignments have been taken seriously and that a reasonable amount of effort has been devoted to each piece of assessment.
- b. Hand in all assignments no later than 6 June.
- c. Attend a minimum of 8 of the 10 tutorials.

Workload

You are expected to spend 200 hours on this course over the whole trimester, which means on average around 15 hours per week. 4 of those hours are consumed with class attendance, and at least another 4 with preparation for and revision after classes, including reading to confirm your understanding of the lecture material. The remaining 7 hours per week need to be spent on preparation for the assignments and for the final test.

Other assessment information

Submitting assignments and tasks. Please:

- Set margins to at least 2.5 cm
- Set line spacing to 1.5
- Set font size of 12 point
- Include page numbers
- Include a title page which shows the course number and name, your name, the course lecturer, the title of the assignment, and the date the assignment is due
- Provide a word count at the end of the assignment (not including the Reference section)
- Type on one side of A4 paper
- Staple pages together
- Avoid presenting assignments in bulky folders or sleeves
- Avoid inserting individual pages in clearfile sleeves

Marking information will be given with the assignment descriptions. It will be based on students demonstrating understanding of both the processes of language acquisition and how language data informs us of those processes.

Submission and return of work

A hard copy of your assignments should be handed in to the LALS Office (VZ210) strictly by 5 pm on the day it is due. You will find an assignment box next to the office window on the left. Please ensure you submit a cover sheet with your assignments (cover sheets can be downloaded from BlackBoard). Also make sure you keep a back-up copy of your assignments. An electronic copy of your assignment should be submitted via Turnitin (link available on BlackBoard) by 5 pm on the day it is due.

Reasonable accommodation is made with respect to assessment procedures for students with disabilities.

Marked assignments will be given back within two weeks following the deadline (where assignment is due before a break, assignments will be given back after the break). Test results will be posted on BlackBoard within two weeks following the test. Marked tests are not given back but students can make an appointment with the course co-ordinator to see their work.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

You should not require extensions for your assignments. However, if some circumstances arise in which you do, please contact the course co-ordinator, preferably in advance, to arrange one.

Penalties

In line with school policy, assignments handed in after the due date will receive a considerably reduced grade, unless accompanied by a medical certificate or other

evidence of exceptional circumstances. If you require an extension for good reasons, ask the course coordinator ahead of the date for handing in the assignment.

The assignments are due by **5 pm** on the due date, after which a penalty of 5% per working day applies. Penalties increase each day until one week after the due date when the maximum grade possible is C- and no personal comment will be provided. Assignments handed in after this time receive no mark.

Plagiarism is not acceptable in assessed work, and will be penalised. The penalty will depend on the severity of the plagiarism.

Check BlackBoard regularly for additional readings mentioned in lectures. Essential readings are also provided in the lecture schedule (given in the first class and available on BlackBoard).
