## **Prescription**

A study of the origins, development and distinctiveness of New Zealand English, including both the structures and patterns of usage in this variety.

## **Course content**

The course will provide a linguistic and sociolinguistic discussion of the origins and current features of the English of New Zealand, including a description of its structures and uses. A detailed summary of lecture content will be distributed via Blackboard at the start of the trimester.

# **Course Learning objectives (CLOSs)**

By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- Outline theories of how new varieties of (post-)colonial Englishes have emerged.
- 2. Identify a range of distinguishing linguistic and lexical features of NZE.
- 3. Indicate how NZE relates to varieties of English elsewhere in the world
- 4. Discuss problems involved in identifying sources of NZE.
- 5. Assess the evidence for regional variation in New Zealand English
- 6. Identify the non-linguistic (social and cultural) variables that influence linguistic and discourse variation in New Zealand English.
- 7. Describe the relationships between attitudes to New Zealand English and sociolinguistic patterns of language use.
- 8. Carry out an independent research project into the origin and sociolinguistic pattern of use of a distinctive feature of New Zealand English and its relationship to other varieties of English.

# **Teaching format**

The content of LING 422 will be delivered through lectures, and tutorials as above, timetabled with LING 322. Students will be expected to complete additional detailed reading, especially in areas chosen for research projects.

# **Mandatory course requirements**

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Attend at least 8 of the 11 tutorials. If a student misses more than three tutorials for any reason, they will be required to hand in relevant pieces of written work (to be specified by their tutor) relating to the topics of the missed classes (i.e. beyond the first three missed tutorials), and completion of this work will be taken as fulfilment of the attendance requirement.
- 2. Make a satisfactory attempt to complete assessment requirements.
  "Satisfactory" means that where they have not reached a C standard, work must nevertheless reflect the fact that the assignment has been taken seriously and that a reasonable amount of effort has been devoted to the topic. No work handed in after 5pm on 18 June may count for these purposes.

#### Workload

In order to make satisfactory progress in this course you should expect to devote a total of 300 hours to it over the course of the trimester. This includes attendance at lectures and tutorials, preparation for tutorials, and background reading, and also includes approximately 30 hours for the literature review, 10 hours for the presentation and 60 hours for the project. Some students will find they need to do more than this, and students aiming for high grades will almost certainly need to do more.

There will be three items of assessment:

During the course of studying for LING 422, students will complete a short literature review, make a seminar presentation to other LING 422 students and course staff, and carry out a small-scale research project. Topics for these assessment components will be negotiated with the course staff, based on the lecture content. In completing these assignments, students will demonstrate familiarity with particular linguistic features of NZ English, how they relate to other varieties of English, and their sociolinguistic patterns of use (CLOs 1-8).

Information on marking criteria will be included with each assessment.

**N.B.** Note that if no work is submitted for assessment before the last three weeks of teaching, there will be nothing on which to base an aegrotat consideration.

#### Submission and return of work

Assignments should be handed in to the lecturer in class (preferable) or to the LALS Office (VZ210) no later than 1.10pm on the day the assignment is due. Please keep a back-up copy of your assignment.

Marked assignments will be returned in class approximately one week after the due date.

## **Extensions and penalties**

#### **Extensions**

If you require an extension for good reasons, ask the course coordinator ahead of the date for handing in the assignment.

#### **Penalties**
