PRESCRIPTION

Advanced study of a selected topic in jazz. 2014 Offering: From its earliest days, jazz has been understood as a distinctly modern music. Although the language and context vary, the characterisation of jazz as an urban musical vehicle for the negotiation and expression of twentieth-century public life has dominated popular and critical discourse. Through a series of issue- and performer-based case studies, this course explores jazz through the discourse of musical modernity within both popular music and twentieth-century concert music. The course is intended for students from a variety of backgrounds and perspectives, including performance, composition, music studies, and humanities more broadly. Co-taught with MUSC 228.

PAPER LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper/course will be able to:

- 1. describe the historical development of jazz
- 2. explain and evaluate a range of critical approaches to jazz as a popular music and a modern art form
- 3. critically evaluate a selection of jazz performances and recordings
- 4. undertake research at a advanced level and create original scholarly work on jazz cultures in relation to the literature.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises one 50-minute lecture and one 110-minute lecture per week.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this paper/course (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures related to this paper/course
- c) attend at least one Music Forum seminar presentation in the term the course is taught.

If for health reasons you are unable to complete all the work required for assessment purposes for this paper by 2 July, you may, on presentation of a medical certificate, have the date for submission extended by the Director, NZSM.

WORKLOAD

A 20-point one-trimester paper should require at least 200 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Specific workload demands will change from week to week based on assessment schedules. However, as a general rule, each week you should plan to devote five to six hours to assigned reading and listening, two to three hours preparing written work, and one to two hours reviewing previous materials and preparing for tests and examinations.

ASSESSMENT

Approved assessment regime

There are four items of assessment:

- 1. Portfolio of 8-10 informal responses (500-600 words each). Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (25%).
- 2. 4

Research seminar presentation. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (10%).

- 3. 2 Tests. Related to learning outcomes 1-3. (30%).
- 4. Essay project, comprising abstract, bibliography, and draft (maximum of 3,500 words). Related to learning outcomes 1-4. (35%).
