#### **PRESCRIPTION**

Advanced academic study of the resources, instruments, techniques and stylistic conventions relevant to the performance of music from Renaissance to modern times, with an emphasis on the works of the 18th and 19th centuries. 2014 Offering: Sometimes referred to as performance practice, period performance, or "authentic" performance, "historically informed performance" (HIP) is an historical approach that seeks to uncover and decipher performing techniques of the past in order to better understand the musical culture and expectations of the time. The paper is intended for those majoring in Music Studies as well as performance students. Although we will be focussing on performance practices and musical cultures of the 17th to 20th centuries, jazz students, composers, and musicians and scholars involved in popular music are especially welcomed to the discussion. Co-taught with MUSC 340.

## PAPER LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who successfully complete this paper will be able to:

- explain and evaluate at an advanced level a range of issues involved in historical performance practice including debates about the aesthetic validity of 'historically informed performance'
- 2. explain and evaluate at an advanced level how music in a particular style might originally have sounded, as well as the links between the historical study of style and contemporary approaches to performing
- 3. identify and evaluate the use of primary sources as lines of evidence for historical performance styles
- 4. generate new advanced creative work about music employing skills in scholarly research, academic writing, and performance.

## **TEACHING FORMAT**

This course is divided into two classes; one of 110 minutes duration, the other of 50 minutes duration.

## **MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS**

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this course (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures related to this course
- c) attend at least two Music Forum seminar presentations in the term the course is taught.

## **WORKLOAD**

A 30-point one-trimester paper should require at least 300 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

#### **ASSESSMENT**

## Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

- 1. A portfolio of weekly journal entries (ca 300-600 words each), total of 35% (25% for the weekly entries and 10% for one rewritten entry of no more than 1,200 words). Related to learning outcomes 1-4. (35%).
- 2. A written research project of no more than 5,000 words to include preparatory work. Students may include a short performance component, in which case the word limit is 3,000 words. Related to learning outcomes 1-4. 35% (10% for preparatory work, and 25% for the final project).
- 3. 2-3 short written assignments or a 15-minute oral presentation on an assigned topic or article. Relates to learning outcomes 1-4. (10%).
- 4. Two tests, 10% each. Related to learning outcomes 1-4. (20%).
