# COMMUNICATION OF ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

#### **PRESCRIPTION**

Advanced materials and analytical techniques relating to selected Western art music repertoire after 1900. 2014 Offering: A detailed examination of the developments to harmonic materials and procedures that occurred in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. Firstly, we look back to the changes that occurred with composers such as Schubert, Strauss, and Wagner. We then look at Debussy, Bartok, Stravinsky, and the Second Viennese School. Students learn theoretical tools to help describe and analyse these 'post-tonal' approaches, and we use these tools to not only analyse repertoire of this period, but also to draw links between these early tonal departures and current compositional approaches that rely on similar procedures. Co-taught with MUSC 361.

- 1. demonstrate an advanced technical understanding of the primary musical resources of the 20th/21st century
- 2. complete an advanced analysis of a major musical work from the 20th/21st century
