PAPER LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students who have successfully completed this paper will:

- 1. demonstrate knowledge of the theory and application of the principles of jazz improvisation to an intermediate level
- 2. apply prescribed elements of the jazz language to a jazz improvisation
- 3. play improvised solos over standard forms at a range of tempi using post-bop jazz vocabulary and rhythmic devices appropriate to their instruments
- 4. transcribe, notate and perform improvised solos from a given recording.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises two 1.5-hour lectures per week.
