Prescription

An introduction to issues in applied ethics. Topics may include: the morality of the death penalty, war, cloning, abortion and euthanasia, and the moral status of non-human animals.

Course Content

- In weeks 1-3 Simon Keller will lecture on moral theory and the ethics of abortion.
- In weeks 4-6 Justin Sytsma will lecture on culture and ethical intuitions.
- In weeks 7-12 Nick Agar will lecture on the death penalty, the ethics of war, cloning, and human enhancement.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a broad introductory-level knowledge of some of the central philosophical issues in the topics covered in the course.
- 2. Demonstrate an ability to critically analyse some of the central philosophical issues in the topics covered in the course.

Teaching format

PHIL 106 will involve three 50-minute lectures and one 50-minute tutorial per week. The presumption is that each student will attend all classes (so if information is given in lectures or tutorials, we will assume that all students have it).

Mandatory course requirements

Other than achieving an overall pass mark of 50% there are no mandatory course requirements.

Workload

In accordance with Faculty Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 200 hours to the course throughout the year. An approximate indication of the hours to be spent on each component of the course is as follows:

The essays and examination will be evaluated against the following five criteria:

- 1. directness and clarity in answering the question
- 2. support of answer with relevant and reasoned argument
- 3. knowledge of relevant material presented in readings and lectures
- 4. consideration of alternative viewpoints and arguments
- 5. quality of writing, including clarity of handwriting where relevant

Submission and return of work

All written work must be submitted in hard copy in class, or to the PHIL 106 mailbox outside MY518 by 5.00 pm on the due date. Written work must also be submitted electronically to the PHIL 106 site on Blackboard. All written work must use double-spaced 12-point text, and must include page numbers.

Essays and tests will be returned at times to be advised. If students fail to attend these times, they may collect their essay from the Office, MY 518 between the hours of 2.00 and 3.00 pm from Monday to Friday and must show their Student ID card before collection

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

Extensions may be granted in exceptional circumstances, but all extensions require the student to provide documentation. An extension can be granted only with the prior approval of the course coordinator, and only in exceptional circumstances. Procrastination is not a legitimate ground for

an extension, so plan accordingly. If you have other assignments due around the same time, plan ahead.

If granted an extension, students must agree to a new due date. Contact your lecturer as soon as a problem emerges. Extension forms are available in the School office.

Penalties

Philosophy Programme policy stipulates that late submission of essays is penalised. For PHIL 106 each week or part thereof of lateness, a late assignment gets a 5 point penalty, up to three weeks, after which the assignment will get a zero mark. (i.e. 1-7 days late a loss of 5%; 8-14 days late a loss of 10%; 15-21 days late a loss of 15%, and after that a zero mark.)
