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Prescription

This course will survey and critique the new and emerging field of experimental philosophy.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- Demonstrate a comprehensive understanding of the field of experimental philosophy.
- 2. Exhibit detailed knowledge of the construction of empirical studies relevant to philosophical questions.
- 3. Undertake in-depth logical and critical thinking, especially as it pertains to experimental philosophy.

Teaching format

This course will involve two two-hour lectures per week. There are no tutorials for this course. Students are expected to attend classes regularly, take part in class discussion, and keep up with the reading.

Mandatory course requirements

Other than obtaining an overall pass mark there are no mandatory course requirements.

Workload

In accordance with Faculty Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 200 hours to the course throughout the trimester. An approximate indication of the hours to be spent on each component of the course is as follows:

Submission and return of work

Essays should be submitted electronically through Blackboard. Indicative grades and comments will be posted on blackboard.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

Make-up quizzes will not be given, although the lowest two quiz grades will be dropped for each student. For essays, all extensions must be obtained from the course coordinator, prior to the deadline for submission of the assessment task unless unforeseeable circumstances prevent this. Short extensions of up to 3 days will be automatically granted to any student who requests it with an email prior to the scheduled deadline. Longer extensions need to be negotiated and require justification and supporting evidence. Any work submitted late without an extension having been obtained is subject to penalties (see below).

Penalties

Philosophy Programme policy stipulates that late submission of essays is penalised. Late essays submitted without extensions having been obtained will receive a penalty of 5 points per day (or part thereof) late. No essay will be accepted after 30 June.
