An introduction to speaking, understanding, reading and writing Samoan.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

The study of the Samoan language provides an insight into Samoan thought, culture, and Samoan society. The main focus of this course will be on speaking, reading, and writing Samoan. This will be at a basic level at first, but by the time students complete the subsequent language course 102 they will have read and should be able, with a dictionary to understand basic Samoan texts. This course has three main objectives, and all are of equal importance.

Students who pass the course should be able to:

1. Have a basic understanding and appreciation of the Samoan language
2. Some experience of reading, writing and speaking Samoan.
3. Have the necessary level of competence to take SAMO 102 in the second half year.

The Samoan Studies Programme works together with the Victoria University of Wellington Samoan Students' Association and Samoan Language Week in the promotion of Samoan language and culture. This year SAMO 101 students will be given the option of doing an oral performance presentation assessment for either of these as part of their in-course assessment.

Teaching format

This course is taught in lecture, tutorial and language lab classes. Course content is delivered in lectures. Tutorials provide students the opportunity to discuss previous lectures and notes in a much smaller class. Language labs are in place for students to practice writing, listening and speaking the Samoan language. Participation in all three teaching formats are mandatory. A roll will be kept by your lecturer/tutor.

Mandatory course requirements

The following requirements must be fulfilled in order for students to complete the course successfully, and be eligible to sit the final written examination. In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

1. Attend at least 80% of the lectures. A class roll will be kept by the lecturer.
2. Sit the Oral Test.
3. Attend at least **9** Tutorial sessions.
4. Attend at least **9** Language Laboratory sessions.
5. Complete **ALL** assignments detailed below.
6. Sit the final examination.

Workload

The expectations are that students will work 10 hours per point, therefore a 20 point course equates to 200 hours over the trimester. This includes scheduled contact time, individual or group study, and work on assessment tasks.

Study for Comprehension Test	approximately 2 hours per day
Preparation for In-Course Test	approximately 3-4 hours per week
Preparation for Oral Test	approximately 20 hours
Preparation for Vocabulary Test	approximately 7.5 hours per week
Samoan Language Week (SLW)	approximately 2 hours per day during SLW

In language learning particularly at this level, vocabulary acquisition is a very important component. **Students of SAMO 101 are required to learn at least 30 new words a week (300 words for 10 weeks).** Words will be provided by your lecturer each week for 10 weeks. By the end of the course, SAMO 101 students would have acquired 300 new words in the Samoan language.

1. Comprehension Test

Tuesday 11th March

10%

Students will be tested on their listening and writing skills early on in the Comprehension Test. The test will be conducted in the assigned language lab class. All student scripts will be collected by your lecturer in class. This is an in-class assessment. Students are required to study for approximately 2 hours a day on Samoan language comprehension leading up to the Comprehension test.

2. In Course Test

Thursday 15th May

10%

This test will take place in lecture. Details of the test will be given out during class. The In-Course test tests student sentence structure, vocabulary and comprehension of the Samoan language. Students are required to allocate approximately 3-4 hours per week in preparation for the In-Course Test.

3. Oral Test

Thursday 22nd May

20%

An oral test will be held towards the end of the course. Students must pass this in order to pass mandatory course requirements. This will take place on: Topics and written preparation required for the test will be announced in class. Oral tests will be conducted face-to-face with your lecturer. An approximate of 20 hours preparation for the oral is required by each student.

4. Vocabulary Test

Monday 5th May

10%

Words are an essential ingredient for language learning. This test encourages students to learn new Samoan words from the outset of the course. The test is set for the Monday after mid-trimester break. The test will be held in-class. Words for the Vocabulary test are drawn from the 300 words learned throughout the course. Students are required to spend an approximate of at least 7.5 hours per week (1.5 hours daily) on Samoan language vocabulary provided each week in preparation for the test. The amount of words students will be tested on will be at least three quarters of 300 words (225 words). Students will be tested on these words in the space of 50 minutes (equating to 1 lecture).

5. Samoan Language Week at the Library Assessment

long celebrations. Samoan Language Week will be held during 26-30 May. The theme for Samoan Language Week 2014 is 'Tāofi Mau 'i au Measina'. Through participation or observation, your task is to write a writing assessment in gagana Sāmoa of no more than 200 words on the use of gagana Sāmoa at Samoan Language Week events at Victoria University. Emphasis will be focussed on sentence structure, correct use of the macron and glottal stops, and vocabulary. Further details will be provided in class. Students need to spend an approximate of 2 hours per day during the Samoan language week celebrations in order to meet assignment requirements.

6. Final Examination

40%

A final exam of 3 hours length will be held during the examination period 13 June – 2 July 2014. The exact date and time will be conveyed to students after the trimester break. It is compulsory for you to attend an examination at any time during the examination period.

Submission and return of work

Written assignments are not to be submitted in hardcopy, but in electronic format only. Electronic assignments are submitted as a MS Word file through Blackboard. How to name your file and instructions for uploading your electronic assignment can be found on Blackboard in the "Assignments" section. Your mark and marked assignment with feedback will be found on Blackboard in the same section. It is important that all SAMO 101 assignments are to include the *koma liliu* (glottal stop) and *fa'amamafa* (macron) diacritical marks.

Marking criterias, grade and feedback comments for oral speech test and performance will all be entered on Blackboard within two weeks of the presentation.

Extensions and penalties

Late submissions for student assignments in all Samoan Studies and Pacific Studies undergraduate courses are subject to a penalty, except when accompanied by a medical certificate or evidence of other exceptional circumstances. The exact deduction will be calculated on the basis of one half mark per day late. Where a student is unable to sit a test, a makeup test may be arranged, with the agreement of the course coordinator, when due to a medical certificate of evidence, or other exceptional circumstances.

Assignments submitted more than seven days after a due date or authorised extension will still be accepted in order to meet mandatory course requirements, but will not be marked.
