# **Prescription**

A course which concentrates on developing oral and written skills in the Samoan language. Emphasis on oral performance will be stressed in this course.

# Course learning objectives (CLOs)

This course has three main objectives, and each is of equal importance. Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Have a good understanding and command of everyday spoken and written Samoan.
- 2. Have a basic understanding of formal speechmaking.
- 3. Have the necessary level of competence to take SAMO 202.

# **Teaching format**

Gagana Sāmoa 2A concentrates on developing oral, written and reading skills in the Samoan language. Special emphasis on *oral performance* will be stressed in this course.

The course will be organised into 3 x 1 hour lectures per week, 1 hour of tutorials and 1 hour of language laboratory per week. This is organised thus:

- 1. 3 lectures per week will consist of:
  - 2 x 1 hour lectures on the advanced study of the language
  - 1 x 1 hour lecture on oral Samoan language literature
- 2. 1 x 1 hour tutorial per week with focus on oral practise and communication
- 3. 1 x 1 hour language laboratory for practising oral work.

The Samoan Studies Programme works together with the Victoria University of Wellington Samoan Students' Association and Samoan Language Week in the promotion of Samoan language and culture. This year SAMO 201 students will be given the option of doing an oral performance presentation assessment for either of these as part of their in-course assessment.

# **Mandatory course requirements**

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- Attend at least 80% of lectures:
- Sit the two Oral Tests, and one Written Test
- Complete the written assignment;
- Present the Seminar and Oral Review;
- Attend at least 8 Tutorial sessions;
- Attend at least 8 Language Laboratory sessions;
- Sit the final exam.

### Workload

The expectations are that students will work 10 hours per point, therefore a 20 point course equates to 200 hours over the trimester. This includes scheduled contact time, individual or group study, and work on assessment tasks.

#### **Course Assessment**

The course's assessment is divided into internal assessment and a final examination.

#### **BREAKDOWN OF COURSE WORK**

## (A) Oral Review (10%)

An oral review of a selected piece of spoken text chosen from a radio broadcast. Details will be given out in first week of lectures and loaded on Blackboard. The individual reviews will be presented at selected tutorial times during weeks 5, 6, 7 of trimester.

## (B) First Oral Test (5%)

To be held Week 4. This test will be about 4-5 minutes long and will require you to speak on a selected topic covered in class. You will also answer two spoken questions that will be based on the topic of your speech. Details will be given out in first week of class and loaded on Blackboard.

### (C) Written Test (10%)

This 50 minute class test will take place on Week 6 during class time. Content to be covered in the test will include all materials covered between Weeks 1-5.

#### (D) Seminar (10%)

Present a seminar in the Samoan language based on a reading selected from the list of readings posted on Blackboard. Copies of these readings will be available either on Blackboard or in course reserve in the library.

Seminars will take place during Week 7. It will be no more than 5 minutes long. Details will be given out in Week 2 of trimester and loaded on Blackboard.

#### (E) Written Assignment (10%)

A written assignment of 1000 words is to be handed in by 4pm Friday, 16th May. This assignment will be written bilingually. Topic and details will be given out in Week 4 of class and loaded on Blackboard.

#### (F) Second Oral Speech (15%)

The oral test will be 4-5 minutes long and will be performed at either at a VUW Samoan Language Week Event or at a VUW Samoan Students' Association Event between 26 May and 3 June. You will select a piece of spoken text and work on analysing, memorising and reciting it. The focus of

the text will need to be on a topic area covered in class. Any further details regarding this assignment will be given out in class and loaded on Blackboard.

#### Final Written Examination 40% in total

A three hour exam will be held during the examination period

The following will be tested in the exam:

- 1. Your understanding of grammar and vocabulary (everyday and formal)
- 2. Your understanding of formal Samoan language idioms through process of translating Samoan passages from Samoan to English, English to Samoan
- 3. Your understanding of basic ideas of formal speech making
- 4. Your understanding of the cultural and social nuances of spoken Samoan

#### **LECTURES**

You are required to attend at least 80% of lectures during trimester. A class roll will be kept for each class.

#### **TUTORIALS**

You are required to attend 1 hour of tutorial per week. You are required to attend a minimum of 8 tutorials out of 10 for the trimester. Tutorials will start in the second week of classes.

#### **LANGUAGE LABS**

This is an important part of the programme in which students are expected to attend every session. A minimum of **8 out of 10 sessions** is required in order to satisfy course requirements. Each session is one hour. Language labs start in the second week of the trimester.

#### Submission and return of work

Written assignments are not to be submitted in hardcopy, but in electronic format only. Electronic assignments are submitted as a MS Word file through Blackboard. How to name your file and instructions for uploading your electronic assignment can be found on Blackboard in the "Assignments" section. Your mark and marked assignment with feedback will be found on Blackboard in the same section.

Grade and feedback comments for oral speech test and performance will also be entered on Blackboard within two weeks of the presentation.

# **Extensions and penalties**

Late submissions for student assignments in all Samoan Studies and Pacific Studies undergraduate courses are subject to a penalty, except when accompanied by a medical certificate or evidence of other exceptional circumstances. The exact deduction will be calculated on the basis of one half mark per day late.

Assignments submitted more than seven days after a due date or authorized extension will still be accepted in order to meet mandatory course requirements, but will not be marked. For more information about circumstances warranting extensions, refer to the section on extensions in the Victoria University Assessment Handbook.
