Prescription

Good intelligence is fundamental to achieving sensible security policies and strategies. This course examines the theory and practice of intelligence processes and their relationships to policy outcomes.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Assess the wider strategic context in which the intelligence community operates
- 2. Evaluate the contribution of intelligence in informing government decision-making on national security issues
- 3. Analyse historical and contemporary examples in the practice of intelligence to illustrate leading approaches and challenges
- 4. Evaluate key findings and perspectives on intelligence within the academic literature in the context of intelligence practice

Teaching format

The course is taught through interactive seminars. Students will need to have covered the background reading set for the session and be prepared to discuss the questions of the day in small groups and with the class as a whole. There will be a number of visiting subject matter experts.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must complete the written work, including the final in-class test.

Workload

This is a 30 point course and as such there is an expectation that students will devote some 300 hours across the trimester. This will include 33 contact hours for seminars. The remainder of the workload is up to the individual student. As a guide, time might be spent in seminar preparation (60 hours), essay preparation and writing (120 hours) and revision for the final test (80 hours).

Assessment

Assessment is based on formal essays and an in-class test conducted on-line.
